



Andersen enlivened the bridge world

With the death of Ron Andersen in Chicago July 3, the bridge world lost one of its most colorful characters. Andersen was sometimes controversial and he made a few enemies, but he also had many friends.

Several of them offered tributes to Andersen, who made his mark as a top player --- he was #3 all-time in masterpoints won --- author and commentator.

Roslyn Kurlan of Great Neck NY was one of Andersen's closest associates. She sent this letter to the *Bridge Bulletin* in honor of her friend.

I will always remember Ron Andersen as a charming and brilliant individual. Over the past years of playing with Ron, I came to know him as an exceptional bridge expert and a very good friend. He was fun to play with and he always made me feel he enjoyed our partnership as he helped me to reach his high expectations. Ron's technique was outstanding, and his focused dedication was inspirational.

He was determined to win the 1996 Barry Crane Top 500 because it was named after his very close friend, even though Ron had previously won the McKenney Trophy four times. During this very difficult year, we won many events throughout the United States, which led to his ultimately reaching his goal. If this in itself wasn't difficult enough, Ron constantly fought a battle with significant illness. Nevertheless, Ron was determined to persevere at all costs.

A witty and exuberant person, Ron was a very serious and accomplished bridge player who will be remembered as one of the best ever. He was as critical and analytical of his own game as he was of others when he was the head vugraph commentator at NABCs and world championships. Bridge was his life, and Ron was always willing to give of himself by writing, commentating and giving interviews.

Ron was a wonderful partner and teacher. He was considerate and kind and made me feel confident and capable. My only regret is that I did not know him long enough.

OKbridge acquires Tel-A-Bridge

OKbridge, the world's largest and most popular online bridge club, has acquired Tel-A-Bridge.

OKbridge founder Matthew Clegg said the move "consolidates OKbridge's position as the premiere Internet-based service for rubber and duplicate bridge players."

Under terms of the agreement, OKbridge will receive the assets of Tel-A-Bridge and additional working capital in exchange for a minority equity interest in OKbridge.

Tel-A-Bridge members who signed up for the preview release in June 1997 will receive one month of free time on OKbridge.

OKbridge, founded by Clegg in 1990 as a way to continue playing bridge with dispersed college friends, currently has more than 8000 members worldwide who play about 10,000 hands of duplicate bridge each day. OKbridge was incorporated as a privately held company in 1994.

Tel-A-Bridge was formed in 1992 and has maintained high visibility with a long-running advertising campaign on the back cover of the *Bridge Bulletin*. A series of software problems, however, has repeatedly

Districts 9, 10 in GNT-A final

Teams representing Districts 9 and 10 steamed into the final of the Grand National Teams, Flight A, with impressive victories.

These two teams will play 64 boards today to determine the 1997 GNT champion:

District 9: Jeff Wolfson, Northbrook IL; Robert Levin, Orlando; Jeff Meckstroth, Tampa; Neil Silverman and Richard Pavlicek, Fort Lauderdale, and Michael Seamon, Miami Beach.

District 10: Hjordis Eythorsdottir and Curtis Cheek, Huntsville AL; Steve Beatty, Destrehan LA, and John Onstott, New Orleans.

District 9 defeated the District 21 contingent from California, 138-94. District 10 knocked off District 12 (Michigan), 151-111. The same District 12 team was runner-up in 1996.

Originally the Grand National Teams was a North American contest with all 25 ACBL districts participating. Now it is a United States event, with only the 23 U.S. districts participating.

In 1985 the event was subdivided into three separate events.

West wasn't sure what was going on -- who was bidding to make and who was saving? He thought his double meant that he did not have a first-round diamond control, but partner left it in. And of course 13 tricks came home for Haig Tchamitch and Dick Kaye -- plus 2330.

That was a total swing of 4330 points -- and all you need for 24 IMPs is 4000.

Peter Pender Revisited

In the July *Bridge Bulletin*, there is a feature article about Karen McCallum. She tells of the 1990 Rosenblum Teams in Geneva and a match we (Bob Jones, Mike Smolen, Kerri Sanborn, Karen McCallum, Peter Pender, and Ralph Cohen) played against a great Jimmy Cayne team (Cayne, Chuck Burger, Bob Hamman, Bobby Wolff, Chip Martel and Lew Stansby).

We were trailing at the half, and Cohen was quoted as saying that "there was talk of playing all four men in the final half, but Pender said, 'There are three world champions on this team and they're going to play.'" There's a grain of truth to Ralph's quote, but it isn't quite accurate and it obscures a wonderful story.

Our original team was not with Ralph and Peter, but with Rita Shugart and Mark Itabashi. Rita's last-minute back surgery forced her to cancel her plans for Geneva and Itabashi then also canceled. The other four were still intact as a team, but Kerri insisted that we add another pair. On the eve of a world championship held on another continent, there were precious few Americans we could add.

Peter had been one of America's greatest players over the previous two decades, with a world championship and many national championships under his belt, often playing as teammates with Hamman, Wolff, Martel and Stansby.

In late 1990, however, Peter was not in great demand as a teammate. He was extremely sick with an illness that looked to be fatal, and he had somehow made the trip from San Francisco to Geneva hoping to add on to some reasonable team for one more chance at the big prize. Ralph was available to play with him, so we added them at the last minute.

Peter was so sick that he had great difficulty just walking across the street from his hotel to the playing area. It was hard for him to have a conversation because he couldn't pronounce his words properly. But when it came time to playing bridge, boy, could he still do it. His play was exceptional, and remarkable considering his condition. It was understood at the beginning that Peter would never be allowed to play more than half of any day or any match. His illness made that the only prudent course.

We followed this plan to great effect, easily qualifying through the round-robin stages -- we actually won our bracket in the last stage. This gave us a high seed in the 32-team knockout stage, and when we found ourselves up against Cayne in the round of 16, we were actually the seeded team. Of course we were big underdogs in real life.

Our lineups for the match were pre-determined. The four men would play the first half, with Kerri and Karen to replace Peter and Ralph for the second half. Bear in mind that this was a match against Peter's old teammates -- a match he desperately wanted to win. We were down about 15 IMPs at the half and Peter now wanted to break the team rule and play the second half as well.

I was captain, and in Peter's plea to me to play the second half, he said, "There are three world champions on this team and they should be allowed to play!" I had too much respect for Peter to tell him he couldn't, so when Ralph told me he thought Peter could do it and the rest of the team didn't object, we put Peter and Ralph in for the last half.

They played magnificently. They were out first and Peter assured me that we had 'a chance' as he collapsed on a couch. When Kerri and Karen also came through with a fine set, we had rallied to beat this great team

and propel ourselves into the quarterfinals.

When Bob Hamman came over to congratulate his old teammate on their victory, he told Peter, with great sincerity, that he had played 'smash up'. Great champions know how to lose, too.

Peter had no trouble crossing the street to his hotel that night. He floated.

Sadly, we lost the next day to the German team that eventually won the event amid great controversy. Peter's quest for another world championship was to be denied, but he sure went down fighting.

We said goodbye that night, and I was never to see Peter again. He died within eight weeks.

The next ACBL Nationals were in San Francisco, Peter's home town. As a final touch of class, Peter left enough money to posthumously host a cocktail party for his friends. I was proud to be invited.

delayed the formal introduction of the service.

Albuquerque 1982 was a fun-filled tournament

Albuquerque's last -- and only -- NABC drew a total of 9,776 tables in the summer of 1982.

Here are highlights:

► Chip Martel, Lew Stansby, Ron Von der Porten, Kyle Larsen, Hugh Ross and Peter Pender won their first Grand National Teams title -- it was also the first GNT win for District 21.

Martel, Stansby and Ross are still going strong: they've won the GNT six times as teammates. Larsen won with them on two of those occasions.

Their last GNT victory was at the 1996 Summer NABC in Miami Beach.

► Lynn Deas and Beth Palmer -- along with teammates Norb Kremer and Bill Cole -- tied for first in the Master Mixed Teams and won their first NABC championship.

They tied with Carol and Tommy Sanders, Joan DeWitt McKean and Sidney Lazard -- the fourth time in six years that McKean and Lazard had either won the title outright or tied for first place.

West led the ♣K, continued a club to his partner's ace and ruffed the return. A diamond to the ace allowed East to lead a fourth round of clubs, ruffed by West and overruffed in dummy -- leaving dummy with the singleton ace of trumps.

There seemed to be no way to pick up trumps but Carol ruffed a diamond and led a heart to the jack. East ducked so Carol ruffed another diamond and led a second heart to the 10 and ace.

East returned a heart and now Carol's foresight in ruffing diamonds paid off. She cashed the ♠A and led a diamond. East had only the ♠Q 8 left while Carol still held the ♠K J.

A neat trump coup and as Tommy observed, "You don't see many coups in a two-level partscore."

► Tommy Sanders became a double winner when he and Ron Andersen won the Life Master Pairs.

► "Next round -- all move" was the call in an 11-table side game, and the two East-West players at Table 11 moved to Table 12. After a couple of minutes, Director Jeff Alexander noticed them and said, "Ladies, there is no Table 12 in this game." The ladies thanked him and moved on to Table 13.

► Mike Smolen won the Fishbein Trophy, awarded to the player who wins the most masterpoints at the Summer NABC. Smolen won the NABC Men's Swiss Teams plus three regional victories.

► The event was new but the winners' names were familiar: Dorothy Truscott, Edith Kemp Freilich, Mary Jane Farrell, Nancy Gruver, Stasha Cohen and Randi Montin won the Women's Swiss Teams.

► Charles Peres of the Chicago team read the situation perfectly on this deal from the Grand National Teams semifinal against San Francisco.

Peres was playing with Dan Rotman. Their opponents were Chip Martel and Lew Stansby.

The 3♣ bid was a checkback and 3♥ showed three hearts. Stansby, East, gave Martel a choice by bidding 3NT and Martel elected 4♥.

Peres led his singleton diamond and declarer called for the ace from dummy. Stansby realized the diamond danger, so he tried to counter the peril by immediately leading the ♣K. Rotman took this and did some thinking before finally leading the ♦Q.

Peres saw what was happening, so he ruffed Rotman's good trick to push a spade through. Now there was no way to prevent the defense from taking four tricks -- the ♣A and diamond ruff plus the ♠K and another diamond.

Stansby would have made the hand if Peres did not ruff. Peres could ruff out the ♦J on the next trick but declarer would rise with the ♠A on the return, cash the ♣Q and ruff a club, ruff a diamond high, cash the ♥K A and use the long diamond to pitch his losing spade.

What if Peres decides not to ruff at all? Rotman could cash the top diamonds and probably switch to a trump. Stansby could win in dummy, ruff a diamond high, ruff a club, draw the rest of the trumps and go to the ♠A to cash the good diamond.

Yes, it's true that Rotman could have made it easier by leading a low diamond at trick three. But then Peres would not have had his chance for a brilliancy.

► Shirley Blum will remember this deal from the first final of the Life Master Pairs for the rest of her life.

Play started routinely -- ♣K to the ace, club ruff, spade to dummy, club ruff and another spade to dummy. Fine so far but how was she going to hold her losers to two?

Then Blum saw a way -- finesse the ♦Q, cash the ace and the game was home if South held the doubleton king. So she led dummy's ♦4, South followed with the 3 and Blum was horrified when she played a low diamond.

She almost fell out of her chair when North could do no better than produce the 2. A successful first-round finesse to the 5 -- with all four players following suit!

► The Aces -- Bob Hamman-Bobby Wolff, Alan Sontag-Peter Weichsel, Mike Becker-Ronnie Rubin -- won the Spingold by defeating the original #22 seed -- Mark Molson, Eric Kokish and Peter Nagy of Montreal plus Billy Cohen, native Montrealer who lived in Memphis (now in Las Vegas).

Molson & Co. stunned Malcolm Brachman's squad in the semifinals when they came from 41 points be-

hind after 48 boards to win by 1 IMP.

In the quarterfinals, Molson and Cohen picked up 13 IMPs when they bid to a grand slam:

Molson's 6♣ bid showed a feature. Obviously he had a good weak two-bid and had already shown a diamond feature, so the club feature couldn't be an honor. It had to be a singleton, reasoned Cohen -- and he bid the grand.

► Bob Hamman claimed he didn't have a great play hand "but the last hand of the tournament was a great bidding hand. It shows what bridge is all about."

Hamman won the ♣2 opening lead with dummy's 9 and had nine tricks on a deal where 4♠ is doomed -- the opponents can cash four top tricks.

At the other table, the bidding was 1♠--2♠--4♠. Certainly a reasonable auction and one that would be duplicated at many tables.

According to Hamman, however: "I think one of the real problems is that your inexperienced players don't look for 3NT on these hands where they find the major suit fit.

"A lot of your five-card major systems in Eastern Scientific are built on the premise that once you find a five-card major fit, your troubles are over. On this deal 3NT is laydown, 4♠ is hopeless."

The bridge challenge, a weeklong series of computer matches and demonstrations, will kick off with two special IMP pairs game pitting humans versus computers on Monday and Wednesday.

Applications are sought for human pairs or individuals interested in participating in the first-ever ACBL-sanctioned human vs. computer contest. Applicants should have 100-1000 masterpoints. There is no entry fee and masterpoints are available. Prizes are available for human and computer entrants. Entrants will receive \$15 in scrip.

The top several programs from the IMP pairs game will enter a computer vs. computer challenge match beginning Thursday. The Championship Challenge Match may be seen on vugraph Friday evening.

Throughout the week there will be a Computer Fair between sessions. The latest in bridge software will be available for player inspection.

The Summer NABC through the years

This annual American Contract Bridge League tournament, formerly called the Summer Nationals, has been held since 1929 in July or early August.

These championships, usually the largest of the three NABCs, were originally held under the auspices of the American Bridge League. Since 1938, they have been run by the ACBL.

In the Thirties, the tournament was played at Asbury Park NJ and lasted eight days. In post-World War II days, the program was gradually enlarged to nine days.

By 1969, the tournament lasted 10 days and in 1979, a pre-tournament Charity Gala was added. The gala has become a substantial bridge event with 156 tables in play in the Charity Pairs and Charity Knockout Teams in 1991.

In 1930, the Knockout Team event (now the Spingold) attracted 16 teams. Twenty-two pairs entered the Master Pairs for the von Zedtwitz Gold Cup (now the six-session Life Master Pairs).

Last year in Miami Beach, 90 teams entered the Spingold and 302 pairs entered the LM Pairs.

Table counts for the early tournaments are not available. The record for attendance was set in Las Vegas in 1991 -- 24,221 tables!

What's coming up for entertainment?

Cohen led a low spade, taken in dummy with the ace. Harris followed quickly with the ♠K and a spade ruff. Harris then led a diamond, taken by Cohen with the ace.

Cohen got out with the ♦8, which Harris won with the 9, pitching a club from dummy. He then played a low heart to the ace. When Berkowitz discarded, it was a shock, but Harris coolly cashed the ♣A and played a club to his king, dropping Cohen's queen. The ♦K was cashed and Cohen had to follow.

When Harris played the ♦J at trick 10, Cohen was in a pickle. He had ♥Q 9 8 7, but dummy still had the ♥10. If Cohen ruffed high, Harris could pitch dummy's last club and take the rest with high trumps. In practice, Cohen ruffed with the 7. Harris overruffed with dummy's 10 and played a club. Cohen had to ruff and lead into the heart tenace at the end. Plus 650 was good for 52 out of 64 matchpoints.

Parking

Ron Andersen Continued from page 1

Tommy Sanders, Nashville businessman and many-time North American champion, was also a frequent partner of Andersen, known to regulars at NABCs as "The Hog" for his prognostications in the *Daily Bulletins*.

Here is part of a eulogy Sanders wrote for Andersen's funeral in tiny Dike IA, where The Hog grew up and learned to play bridge.

We had a good friendship. He was better at communicating than I was. Maybe that was because I was easy to find --- he was always on the go. He always remembered to send a postcard from overseas. It was fun keeping up with his travels that way. At Christmas, he always remembered with a card and a gift. He was generous to our children when they married, and even attended one wedding.

We talked intermittently on the phone. The last time we talked was about three weeks ago (mid-June). He told me about his impending trip to Italy. We laughed about old times, like the time we were in Taipei and played bridge for 15 straight hours (with maybe a 30-minute break). It was an exhibition match in which the outcome didn't matter. To appease our good friends and hosts, we continued to play so more of the local players would have a chance to play against the world-renowned experts. About every hour they would send in a fresh pair, and toward the end they were beating us like a drum.

I didn't tell him about a secret I've always kept from him. Ron and I really enjoyed playing together. In 1982, he taught me how to play the Precision system in a couple of days. The next week, I played that system for the first time, and Ron and I won the Life Master Pairs --- a tribute to his teaching ability.

After that, we had much fun playing together in the U.S. and overseas. The best 16-hand set we never had was on our last trip to Taipei. The marathon game had been our penultimate trip. This time, it was a serious tournament. We were playing Indonesia in the semifinals of the Proton Invitational and the score was close. Before playing the last 16 boards, I happened to stroll into our teammates' playing room and noticed that the directional arrows on the corresponding table were pointed incorrectly. I moved it 90 degrees.

Ron and I proceeded to play double-dummy for the next 16 boards. When we sat down anxiously to compare with our teammates, it was discovered both pairs had sat the same direction. I knew it was probably my fault, but I never said a word. Then, worst of all, we had to play eight more boards and we lost. Hog, if you're listening to this, please forgive me.

Finally, Hoggie, I'm going to miss you a lot --- a whole lot. The world of tournament bridge will not be the same without you. I love you, Hoggie.

Pat Goldfein, in preparing Andersen's obituary for the *Kibitzer* in Chicago, rounded up several amusing stories involving Andersen and bridge that show how much he added to the bridge world. Here is some of what *Kibitzer* readers were treated to:

Andersen first made his mark in the Midwest while a student at the University of Iowa. He earned his first 100 masterpoints by the summer of 1962 and went off to enter the Spingold in Minneapolis as the 104th, and last, seed. His young team knocked off Johnny Crawford's number one seed in their first match, and Ron was on his way. He grabbed the limelight and never wanted to let go.

There are many stories about Ron. Some are true, and some have improved with retelling. Only a few can appear here, in tribute to a man who came alive when the stories began to flow, and who never apologized for living life the way he wanted to.

From Kate Blumenthal:

This was back in the Seventies, when I lived in Milwaukee. I had trouble with my car, and I couldn't get the mechanic to fix it or let it out of the shop.

Ron came in from Madison, where he ran the bridge club to end all bridge clubs. He was wearing his summer uniform of white bucks, white pants and a navy blazer with a large gold crest on the pocket. What a contrast between him and this small, grimy mechanic in his overalls! Ron carefully listened to the mechanic's explanation and then said, in a deep, dramatic voice, "My good man, I understand completely. This is not a matter for a mechanic. This is not a matter for business

Proving his point

Years ago, David Berkowitz and Ron Andersen were partners in the Life Master Pairs. They were cruising along with a pretty good game in the first session when Andersen picked up this hand as dealer:

Deciding to be sneaky, Andersen passed. The next player passed, as did Berkowitz, holding

The player in fourth seat considered his hand, thought things over briefly -- and passed.

The post mortem began.

"I had 11," said one of the opponents.

"I had 10," said the other.

They looked at Berkowitz.

"I had eight," he said.

"So," said one of the opponents to Andersen, "you had 11."

"I had 10," said the man who came to be known as The Hog.

"You couldn't have," the opponents said.

"I had 10," insisted The Hog.

"You can't even count your points," one of the opponents chided.

"Okay," said Andersen with a glare as he turned his hearts face up on the table one by one. "One, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, nine, TEN!"

Andersen and Berkowitz, frigid for 13 tricks in hearts, had conspired to pass out the deal.

The one positive aspect of the comedy is that Berkowitz and Andersen made a bet with another player that, without going minus on a board, they had earned themselves an absolute zero on the board. They were right -- they were the only pair of the 300 or so who played the deal who failed to get a plus.

people. This is a matter. . .for LAWYERS. Who's YOURS?" I had my car that day.

From Barbara Lehman:

In the early Seventies, a group of us went to Thunder Bay ON. Ron was playing with my bridge mentor, Bernie Coleman. In the Open Pairs, where everyone was in the same event, with two masterpoints or 2000, Ron and Bernie sat down against two women.

You know, he liked to butter up the ladies. These two were probably middle-aged, but they had some sass. They were all chatting and the subject of weight comes up. One lady says to Ron, "You could stand to lose a few pounds."

On the first board, Ron psychs, vulnerable, first seat. The opponents miss a laydown 6♥. The hand is over and the first woman figures it out and fumes at Ron, "You psyched!" Ron replies, in an injured voice, "Lady, you called me Fatty!" Things settle down, and they take the next hand out of the board.

The lady turns to Ron and says, "It's your bid. . . Slim."

From Donna Hay and Peter Nagy:

The most famous Ron story involves his diabolical sense of humor ---the "head-banger" story. Ron made a side bet on his Swiss team match that he could get his high-strung opponent to bang his head without using a word.

The bet was on. On an early board, Ron and his partner bid to a small slam, and head-banger's partner led a heart. Declarer, Ron, won with the king and went after trumps, losing a trick to head-banger's partner. When a heart was led for the second time, Ron ruffed! At that point, head-banger started rocking, talking to himself, and then got up and went to the nearest wall and started banging away. Only when head-banger returned to the table did Ron excuse himself and say, "Oh, hearts. . .so sorry." He then retrieved his trump and replaced it with the ♥A!!!

From Bart Bramley and Judy Wadas:

There's a coda to the head-banger story. It goes something like this:

Ron and Sabine Zenkel were leading a bridge tour of Germany and Austria with a nice group of little old ladies. Ron tells his favorite story, about the head-banger, and it gets a big laugh. Then one LOL speaks up: "I'm that player's mother!" Ron wanted to slide away, but she added, "And you got him just right."

Ron was a fierce competitor at the table, and he was terrific away from the table. He was a great host, and, most people would be surprised to know, a great cook.

From Ralph Katz

I held two fundraisers for Children's Memorial Hospital, each featuring a charity auction. Both times Ron called me out of the blue and volunteered himself to be auctioned off for a regional event. He won the event the second time, with Chuck Sheaff. I won't say I always cheered for Ron to win, but I certainly did that time.

From Chuck Sheaff:

I couldn't go to the charity auction, so I asked some friends to bid on a player for me. They came back and announced, "We bought you Ron Andersen."

We finally got together and played last year. He picked up my complicated convention card instantly, played magnificently and we won the regional Flight A pairs. It was the year he won the *Barry Crane Top 500*, but he took the time to play for charity.

From Mary Warden:

Ron was at an NABC, where he always wrote the predictions for the team event as the Hideous Hog. And the Hideous Hog always discussed things in the back booth of a restaurant called Pedro's, with Mr. S and Pretty Lady, or PL (that was me). He would describe the food lovingly, and made everything sound delicious.

Three little old ladies came up to Ron at the vugraph show and kept pestering him. They wanted to know how to get to this imaginary Pedro's.

Ron thinks fast and says "Well, its really hard to find."

"That's okay," they say.

Ron hesitates, then says, "It's not in a good neighborhood."

"We don't mind --- you made it sound so good."

Finally he leans over and whispers,

"The bathrooms are dirty!"

"Oh!"

From Gerald Caravelli:

Ron was somewhat underrated as a player, because he played his best with clients --- playing both sides of the table, so to speak. I first met him 30 years ago, when he was sort of the Iowa farm boy he always joked about.

Things change. We were playing in Pasadena, in the 1977 Vanderbilt. Ron, Kathie Wei, Hugh Maclean, Milt Rosenberg and I were on the same team, and on the first night we went out to dinner at the Holiday Inn. Ron signs the check and tips lavishly.

Second and third nights, same place, same waiter, same thing --- a big, big tip.

Fourth night, we have no reservation and there are no tables, but when the maitre'd sees us, one magically appears. Fifth night, there is no room in our waiter's section. The waiter begins to cry! Tables and people are moved to accommodate us. By the sixth night, Milt's nightly glass of wine has gone from the size of a shot glass to the size of an ice bucket.

That was Ron. □

The winners in each event will have their names engraved on the Morehead Trophy, donated by *The New York Times* in memory of its longtime bridge editor Albert H. Morehead.

Albert H. Morehead

Morehead (1909-1966) was born in Flintstone GA and educated at Baylor and Harvard. Ely Culbertson hired him in 1932 because of his outstanding ability as a player and analyst and made him technical editor of *The Bridge World* in 1933.

He proved so invaluable that in 1934 he was made general manager of all Culbertson enterprises. He was only 25 when he played on the Culbertson team that defeated the British in the second international match for the Schwab Cup.

Morehead was the first bridge editor of *The New York Times* with a Sunday column from 1935 and a daily column from 1959. He resigned from the *Times* late in 1963 to devote full time to writing, editing and publishing of the dictionaries, encyclopedias and thesauruses that made him one of the foremost American lexicographers.

During those years, Morehead found time for tremendous service to organized bridge. He was an officer of the United States Bridge Association when that organization amalgamated with the American Bridge League in 1937.

He became a governor of the newly formed ACBL and served as president in 1943 and chairman of the board from 1943 to 1945. He was named *ACBL Honorary Member* in 1946.

Morehead was a member of the National Laws Commission and was in charge of production of the *International Laws of Contract Bridge*. He was also the author of the constitution of the World Bridge Federation -- the first formal definition of the scope, structure, powers and duties of that organization.

Morehead was named to the ACBL Bridge Hall of Fame in 1996.

Some insight into the man behind all this talent can be found in his obituary in the November 1966 issue of the *Bulletin*. Editor Dick Frey wrote:

"No one ever saw him lose his temper at the bridge table or heard him speak an unkind word to a partner. He smiled often, but the only player he ever laughed at was himself.

"Rarely if ever did he turn down a plea for help. Writing this, I am proud to acknowledge the debt I owe him and to claim that he was my best friend. The secret of his greatness was that there are scores of others who will truly say exactly this of Albert Hodges Morehead."

"I was bored," said Susanne. "I was trying to amuse myself, and I was getting to be computer literate. I found the bridge server and I tried it."

It was much the same with Dawn. "I found bridge, but I was frustrated by my ignorance. I watched and I so badly wanted to learn. It's so hard to learn anything from ground zero by yourself."

Both Dawn and Susanne liked what they saw on OKbridge -- but how were they ever going to learn how to play? Dawn took the direct approach -- she wrote a letter to the OKbridge discussion group. She told them that there was a bridge club in Nashville, the Vanderbilt Club, which had an Adopt-a-Novice program. How could she learn enough to be able to take advantage of the program?

Well, the responses from novices and experts alike poured in -- hundreds of them. They told her about the Fifth Chair mentor-novice program whereby an expert takes a novice under his or her wing and helps the newcomer learn how to fly.

By this time Susanne and Dawn had met on OKbridge. They happened to sign up for the same table and wound up as partners. They found they enjoyed each other, and they've been regular partners ever since.

It wasn't long before they both got mentors. Otto Adamec worked with Dawn and Hank Gagnon was Susanne's mentor. The special help they received by playing with their mentors and asking lots of questions improved their game immeasurably.

The Fifth Chair program is exceptional. The mentor plays with the novice on a weekly basis. The novice can email the expert at any time with questions. And they take part in monthly mentor-expert tournaments on OKbridge.

Susanne and Dawn played with cards for the first time at the Fall NABC in San Francisco last year. They were quite successful -- they won 10 red points apiece.

"I'm the original Fifth Chair novice," said Dawn. "I was the first novice to be adopted. As a matter of fact, I'm the token novice on the Fifth Chair board of directors."

The mentor program is free -- the mentors volunteer and are not paid. "It's available to people who want to learn," said Dawn. "And the newcomers are always surprised that they're getting all this help at no cost to them. It's a wonderful program."

Susanne had high praise for OKbridge. "I don't think I would ever had a chance to play this wonderful game if it hadn't been for OKbridge. I don't think it ever would have occurred to me to try to find out more about the game locally. I was into the Internet, and there was OKbridge." □

Twists of fate

How would you like to be in 6♥ on the following cards with the lead of the ♣K? Do you fancy your chances? Would you play the same at matchpoints and IMPs?

♠K 9 7 3
♥A J 7 6
♦K Q 10
♣A 9

♠A J 4
♥K 10 8 4 3
♦A 8 7
♣8 6

You win the opening lead, of course, and consider your chances. If hearts are 2-2 (or if the queen falls singleton), you could pull trumps, cash diamonds and exit with a club, giving yourself an extra chance in spades -- the ♠10 with East, for example perhaps West started with the ♣K Q J 10.

Of course, at matchpoints you might also consider whether you should try to make seven by playing on spades. Having reached a reasonable slam on 29 high-card points, you would hardly consider risking what might be a cold contract in a search for a 13th trick.

Suppose, then, that you play two top hearts and find that East started with three to the queen. You could still cash diamonds and exit with a club, aiming to hold your loss to down one. Of course, that is unthinkable at IMPs. Even at matchpoints, when you have so many high-card points between two hands, you're probably destined for a very poor result if you go minus, so you might as well try to make it.

Your only shot is to bring in the spade suit, hoping to be able to discard your losing club.

You're at trick four now after the ♣A, ♥A and a heart to the king (West discarding). You play a diamond to dummy and follow with a low spade to the jack, which holds. When you cash the ♠A, East follows with the queen.

Now what? East, of course, would play the ♠Q from an original holding of Q-10-x, so you have no guarantees. Since West has a singleton trump, you might consider him more likely to have started with four spades to the 10, so finessing the 9 might seem a better prospect.

The key point, however, is that if East started with a doubleton ♠Q, you're going down. He will ruff the third round of spades and the defenders will cash a club.

So your only chance is to play for 3-3 spades and lead your low spade to the king. If East follows, you can discard your losing club on the 13th spade and come home with 12 tricks.

The irony of the deal is that the lead of the ♣K forced you to find the only line of play to make your contract. Without it, you might have gone for the falsecard in spades and taken the third-round finesse of the 9. When it failed you would have been a trick short.

Larry Cohen, who played and made 6♥ on Board 10 in the first qualifying session of the Life Master Pairs, made these observations about the deal, seen below (hands rotated for convenience).

Many pairs, Cohen observed, would play the contract from North after an opening 1NT by North and a transfer to hearts by South. If East somehow found the club lead on this occasion, he might end up being sorry he did.

When you play Precision, there's always an air of excitement when you or partner opens 1♣, showing a strong hand. It doesn't show clubs, of course -- at least not necessarily.

On consecutive deals in the first qualifying session of the Life Master Pairs, defending champions David Berkowitz and Larry Cohen each opened 1♣ and had a total of 22 clubs between them, making for some interesting bidding.

The champs made the most of their opportunities.

West bid 2♣ before Cohen could Alert the 1♣ bid, and when Cohen asked what the 2♣ bid meant, East said he believed it showed the majors. Cohen had never seen a 2♣ bid in that situation used to show the majors -- most pairs play double shows the majors, leaving 2♣ as natural -- so he wasn't sure what 3♣ would mean to Berkowitz.

Berkowitz was equally dubious about the meaning of Cohen's 3♣ bid. After considerable thought, Berkowitz simply blasted into the club slam. East thought he was taking out some insurance by bidding 6♥, but it turned out to be a phantom -- 6♣ had no legitimate play. Berkowitz and Cohen took one spade and two diamonds for plus 300 and 45.5 out of 64 matchpoints.

The following deal featured another monster club fit for North-South, and the defending champs took full advantage.
