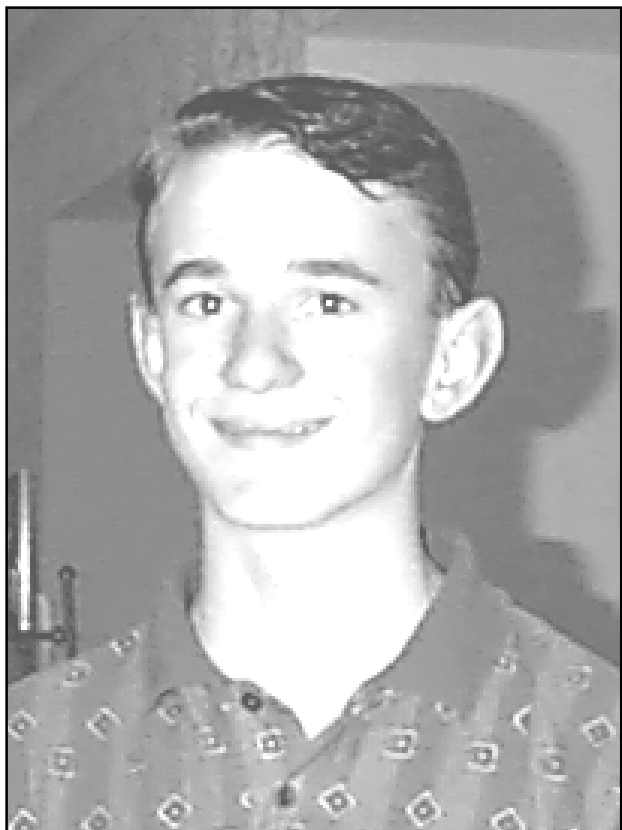

## Canada's youngest LM -- David Sabourin

When David Sabourin of Ottawa became a Life Master in the Midnight Swiss night before last, he became a very special Life Master -- he now is Canada's youngest Life Master ever. He achieved the feat at the age of 14 years, 0 months and 11 days. The previous record holder was Gavin Wolpert of Toronto, who was 14 years, six months and 19 days when he got his gold card.

David began playing two and a half years ago, and he started right out in duplicate. "I've never played house bridge in my life," he said. His mother, Elizabeth Scott, and her boyfriend, Paul Hardy, both Life

## Californians pull ahead in Red Ribbon Pairs

Jack Margid of San Francisco and Susan Furchtenicht of Santa Maria CA had two strong sessions in the Red Ribbon Pairs qualifying and will lead the way into today's two final sessions. Their score of 822.48 gave them a 25-point lead over runners-up Larry Ascher of New York City and Mike Botwin of Baldwin NY. In third place were Bob and Kay Korte of Woodstock IL, half a point out of second.

## Comeback of decade: Reiman, down 60, defeats Root by 24

It looked as if it was all over. The team captained by Bill Root was 60 IMPs ahead of Jim Reiman's squad with only 16 boards to go in their second-round Spingold match. Sixteen boards later REIMAN had advanced to the third round and ROOT was on the sidelines.

The score after 48 boards was ROOT 130, REIMAN 70. But a spectacular set saw REIMAN picking up 99 IMPs, more than six per board, while holding the opponents to just 15. Playing with Reiman were Frederick Allenspach, William Doroshow and James Ward. Root's team consisted of Bob Jones, David Lindop, Dan Gerstman, Harry Tudor and Boris Baran.

The comeback by Bobby Wolff's team ordinarily would have been our lead story today. WOLFF was

MEYERS was down 21 IMPs after three quarters of play to Eunice PORTNOY (Jacqueline Sincoff, Barbara Clinton, Candace Fowler, Barbara Lehman and Joan Eaton), but won the last set by 23 IMPs, to narrowly win the match 112-110.

In an upset, 12th-seeded Julie ROWE (Beverly Bluth, Lynne Schaeffer, Brenda Bryant, Nancy Sachs and Sondra Schubiner) defeated the number five seed Sally WOOLSEY (Jan Martel, Judy Pede, Carren Hinds, Katarina Midskog and Jill Mellstrom), 130-94.

## Goldman discusses future, bridge

Bobby Goldman is one of the most enduring figures of the contemporary American, and indeed world, bridge scene. The 59-year-old Goldman is still perhaps best-known to the majority of players from his role as a member of the original Aces, Ira Corn's Texas-based squad created to bring the world championship title to the U.S.

A cursory examination of Goldman's accomplishments is sufficient to reveal his status as an icon of the game. An ACBL and WBF Grand Master, Goldman has amassed 25,000 masterpoints, won four world championships, and has 19 NABC titles.

He is also an author (*Aces Scientific, Winners and Losers at the Bridge Table*), bidding theorist and teacher.

Goldman has given back to the game as well, serving as ACBL recorder from 1968-88, and as a prominent member of the Competition and Conventions Committee.

While declaring a contract of 4♠ in yesterday's open pairs, Gargrave realized that a comment that he had overheard earlier in the session pertained to the deal he was currently playing. He summoned the director, who instructed him to continue play.

Gargrave made five, but indicated that the unauthorized information he possessed had allowed him to make an overtrick, and that the opponents, the Augustines, were probably entitled to some redress. The tournament director awarded the Augustines an average plus.

"We were very proud of him for being so honest," said Penny.

# The Inhuman Element

The one marketplace in which bridge has shown growth in the last decade is the computer world. There are two kinds of computer bridge, stand-alone software and on-line activities. The latter offer a multitude of terrific services, including web sites and interactive "virtual" bridge clubs.

The latest company to sprout on the Net is my own, Bridge Today University, in which people can take bridge lessons by E-mail. (A short commercial break: This new company, which includes Bridge Today Magazine, is now offering up to 22% in shares, \$8,000 per one percent, treated as loans -- interested parties may contact me by E-mail for more details or buttonhole our PR rep, ex-tennis promoter Larry King, between now and Sunday.)

Stand-alone products (those you buy for home use, which are not connected to the Internet) have been most successful when they're programmed with specific hands for teaching. Software that allows the user to play against the computer has not shown ability above the novice level until recently, with the emergence of a product called, "Goren In a Box," or "GIB." GIB was created by Matt Ginsberg, and yesterday morning played a challenge match against humans Michael Rosenberg and Zia, shown by vugraph on the OKbridge Internet Club.

GIB and his partner, GIB2, lost to the humans, but not without a good fight. Observers say that the witty Zia may have been concentrating too much on his glib table talk, but neither GIB nor his cloned partner took notice. (At one point Zia psyched the GIBs out of a 4♥ game and this was considered unfair pool. The director failed to change the result, however.) On one of the more emotional boards, the GIBs found their way to a respectable sacrifice against rather complicated bidding methods by the humans.

GIB showed tremendous discipline (one of the advantages of being inhuman) when it passed the chance to open a diamond preempt with a side four-card major. The human Rosenberg, however, demonstrated the other extreme as he opened a whimsical 3♦ (multi) in second position. (Rosenberg goes by

the pseudonym Nod, which stands for "Nine Of Diamonds," a card known as the "Curse of Scotland.") North passed and Zia, East, bid 3♠. This told Rosenberg to pass if he held spades and bid 4♥ otherwise. Now GIB threw in a brave four-level overcall and Rosenberg was forced to bid 4♥, as his partner commanded (pass would have indicated spades). Perhaps it took an inhuman partnership to overcome this chicanery, as North, GIB2, raised to 5♦.

It was at this point critics of the GIBs (showing that human jealousy trait) pointed out that in a well-oiled partnership, North-South would have been able to make a responsive double of 4♥ with the North cards, allowing South to bid 4♠. This may be true, but the direct 5♦ raise had the merit of escaping the double, as Zia, unsure that a heart trick would cash, meekly passed, allowing the GIBs to steal the show.

Rosenberg led the ♥J and Zia cashed two club tricks and led a third club. GIB was about to lean over and claim when it suddenly discarded a spade (to the dismay of its Dr. Frankenstein inventor, no doubt). Rosenberg won the ♣Q and quickly shot back the fourth club for Zia to ruff. GIB was no longer able to discard a second spade on the ♣J, and the contract was three down. This was a bit humiliating to the GIBs, but even more to Zia who had not defeated a five-level contract three tricks undoubled since before the war (any war).

Rosenberg was quick to excuse GIB's play. "He's only wrong when I hold four clubs to the queen. If I hold three to the queen or a doubleton club and diamonds are 3-0, his spade discard actually gains a trick." Reprieved by the computer-like analysis of the human on his left, GIB was all smiles. It was heartwarming to see.

A final thought: "In the last decade, the computer tidal wave has swept away all before it," said Zia afterwards. "But bridge is the one bastion of human existence that will never be toppled by a machine." He may be right, but I still think the Internet will become a fantastic marketplace for teaching the game.

Why didn't Ken Mohr bid? It probably had something to do with the state of the match -- his team was way behind, and he may have thought this was the best way to create a swing. Anyway, he is still waiting to bid.

Ivan cashed his ♣A on opening lead and led a second club for partner to ruff. When Ken cashed his ♥A, Ivan dropped the queen! Of course Ken led another heart, and Eddie was at the crossroads. If he ruffed low, he feared that West would overruff and give East another club ruff.

So he played it "safe" -- he ruffed with the king, then groaned when he saw Ivan follow suit. Now he had yo go down -- Ivan's 10 of trumps would be the setting trick.

But Ken's wish for a big swing did not materialize. At the other table, Kantar's teammates competed and bought the hand for 4♦ making, for a 1-IMP pickup.

## How California won the GNT-A

Some members of the victorious District 22 GNT-A squad (Mark Itabashi, Fred Hamilton, Gene Simpson, Jon Wittes and Ross Grabel) will concede they play a fairly aggressive game. Itabashi offered the further observation that when two aggressive pairs clash at the table, it isn't unusual to see somebody "go for a number". Consider this auction from their semifinal match against District 3:

"My 1♠ overcall is sort of aggressive," said Itabashi, who is obviously a master of understatement, "but it worked out well here. The auction took a bad turn for the opponents and Fred started doubling."

The play was unpleasant (for Weinstein, anyway) and declarer finished down two, plus 500 for District 22 (California), who went on to win the match 201-96.

In the final, the California played a powerful squad from Texas. The District 16 team included Malcolm Brachman, Mike Passell, John Sutherlin, Bobby Goldman and Eddie Wold.

"We really didn't do anything special," said Itabashi of his team's performance.

"We seemed to just play steady and the opponents seemed to make more mistakes. Also, some of the deals we played catered to some of our systemic agreements."

Hampson won the ♦A, cashed the ♦K and ruffed a diamond, establishing the suit. A low club was now ruffed in the closed hand and Hampson played a diamond. 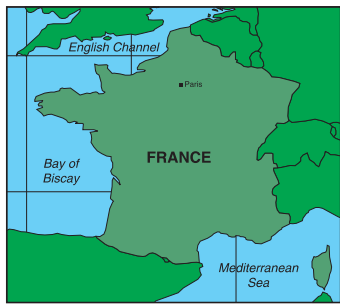

East led a trump to the jack and queen, and Michael led a diamond to the king and Marshall's ace. Marshall continued a diamond, and Michael won to lead the ♣K. Once again Marshall won. "I could have beaten the contract at this point by returning a club," he said, "but I actually led a heart."

Declarer ruffed, cashed the ace of trumps and began cashing diamonds. There was no way he could be prevented from pitching two clubs from dummy, so Michael scored up his game.

But Michael might have done better not to touch clubs at all. After winning the second diamond, he could cash the ace of trumps and then continue with diamonds. Declarer could get rid of two clubs no matter how East defended.

**The Facts:** 4♥ made four, plus 620 for N/S. The Director was called when the dummy was put down. N/S stated that they believed the slow 2♠ bid demonstrably suggested that 4♥ would be a better contract than 4♠. The Director ruled Law 73F1 had not been violated and that the table result would stand.



**The Appeal:** N/S appealed the Director's ruling. North and West attended the hearing. North stated that there had been a 20-second break in tempo by East. He believed that the break in tempo created the unauthorized information that East may have only a three-card spade suit.

West stated he had paused for 60 seconds before he bid 4♥. He reasoned that since he was 4-3-3-3 and if partner had to ruff during the play of the hand he would be ruffing with high trumps since he held ♠A762. For that reason West believed 4♥ was a better contract.

**The Committee Decision:** The Committee determined there had been a break in tempo. The Committee questioned West and found out that there was no unusual meaning for the negative double. West did not assert that he intended to give his partner a choice of contracts. The Committee believed that there were three possible bids by West: 3♦, 4♥, and 4♠.

The Committee believed that most players would bid 3♦ or 4♥, but that 4♠ was a logical alternative. The Committee agreed that the out-of-tempo 2♠ bid suggested that East had only three spades and that 4♥ could demonstrably have been suggested over another by his partner's break in tempo (Law 73F1).

The Committee decided to award an adjusted score (Law 12C2). For E/W, the offenders, the Committee decided that the most unfavorable result that was at all probable was 4♠ down one because some in West's peer group would choose to play in the 4-4 spade fit rather than the 5-3 heart fit. For N/S, the non-offenders, the Committee decided that the most favorable result that was likely had the irregularity not occurred was 4♥ made four. For N/S, the contract was changed to 4♥ made four, minus 620. For E/W the contract was changed to 4♠ down one, minus 100.

**The Facts:** 7NT made seven, plus 1520 for N/S. The Director ruled that there had been a break in tempo. The contract was changed to 7♠ made seven, plus 1510 for N/S.

**The Appeal:** Both sides appealed the Director's ruling. E/W stated that South should pass 5♥ as it was possible to construct a North hand consistent with prior bids that would make any advancement dangerous, but the slow 5♥ bid suggested otherwise.

N/S stated that spades were clearly established as trump, and therefore, while hearts had been bid naturally previously, 5♥ was an obvious cuebid. After the second diamond cuebid, North could count 13 tricks.

**The Committee Decision:** The Committee decided that North had all the information necessary to count 13 tricks in a notrump contract. Since spades were not bid at the seven-level and N/S had never considered a 6♠ contract, the Committee could find no basis to change the contract to a strain other than notrump.

As for E/W's appeal, to suggest that 5♥ could be meant to be the final contract was considered ludicrous for players of this level. The Committee believed its time had been completely wasted by the whole incident that was caused by the silly objections of E/W at the table.

The contract was changed to 7NT made seven, plus 1520 for N/S. The N/S deposit was returned. The E/W deposit was retained and a one-quarter board procedural penalty was assessed. [Although the ACBL Board of Directors recently recinded the regulation requiring a deposit for appeals in NABC+ events, the new policy had not yet taken effect as of the time of this appeal - Ed]

Harry Tudor, West, led his singleton club that rode to the ace. Declarer Nate Ward led a heart to the 9 and quickly learned one of the reasons for the double -- East showed out. Ward led a diamond to his king, taken by Tudor, who returned a diamond to the jack. Ward sluffed a spade on the ♦Q and ruffed a diamond. He led the trump queen, ducked, but Tudor took his king on the next trump lead. He got out out of his hand with a heart to the 10, and Ward cashed his trump ace, leaving Tudor with the case heart. When Ward then led a club, Tudor ruffed and led a spade. Ward guessed correctly, putting up the queen from dummy. That gave him his doubled vulnerable contract.

What helped Ward make the right decision? When West doubled, East hesitated before passing.

Goldman's most recent contribution to the game has been his keen interest in the development of bridge on the internet.

"I believe that this may be the last hope to save the game. I'm doing what I can in this regard to help promote internet bridge.

"A commonly asked question is whether computer bridge is good or bad for ACBL bridge. For some club owners, it's definitely bad, because many of their potential customers are staying home to play cards, but the positive aspects are greater. People can learn about the game on the internet and then they can migrate to the more social phase of the game at a club or tournament. In the long run it's good for bridge.

"On OKbridge, I do consulting, I play in matches with Paul Soloway and I do advanced topics lectures. One important concern in the field of commercialization of the game on the internet is making bridge comprehensible to the public. It needs to be simple, and by that I mean bidding needs to be fairly natural even it means tournaments have to be encumbered by bidding restrictions. Of course, there are many experts who would disagree with me here."

Goldman has played in every NABC since 1967, and was a member of the aforementioned Aces until 1974. It was shortly thereafter that Goldman struck up a long-term partnership with ACBL #1 masterpoint-holder Paul Soloway.

"Paul and I have played the preponderance of years since then, with a few exceptions that occurred for professional reasons only," said Goldman of the 24-year relationship.

The pair has played professionally on a number of teams. Among the most recent was a stint on the team of Jimmy Cayne, an expert player and a frequent team sponsor. They were members of the Cayne squad for three years before (for a variety of reasons) they were cut from the team.

"That was around 1994, and when Paul and I began looking around for other possible arrangements, we saw that there had been a change in the marketplace. There was a large influx of foreign players who had been able to get onto some good teams at lower pay than many domestic experts would work for. So this created an unfavorable supply-and-demand situation for top-level players. We were having trouble generating interest at the fees we were used to getting," said Goldman.

"We eventually worked out an arrangement with Richie Schwartz when he expressed interest in forming a team. We had some mixed results. We were second in the Miami Spingold, after having to adjust out team roster for the ailing Peter Boyd. We were third in the Reisinger that year, and then we won the 1997 Vanderbilt. That turned out to be the high point of the year, however, and by the end of '97 Schwartz had decided to release us.

"We were still scheduled to play with Schwartz through the '98 Vanderbilt. We made it clear to him that although Paul and I knew we would no longer be associated with his team after that event, we would still play our best for him at Reno."

Goldman explained that it was especially satisfying for him as a professional that the Schwartz team was able to repeat its victory in the Vanderbilt this year, despite the fact that the arrangement with Schwartz was coming to a close.

"So at the end of '97 we went out to find another situation, only to find the market even weaker than before. Nothing was occurring.

"It was then that Bob Hamman first approached Soloway about playing on Nick Nickell's team. Paul came to me immediately and said that he was seriously considering accepting the offer since we were having trouble getting work. He explained it to me and we discussed it. We gave ourselves another month to find something together. When we didn't, we decided it was time to split.

"I have great respect for Paul and I value our friendship. I don't have any negative feelings about the situation, or about Bob Hamman or Nick Nickell, who I think is a first-class guy.

"Paul and I continue to play in regionals (at Winston-Salem we won three out of the five events) and, of course, we are playing together on OKbridge in the "Goldway" matches. But as far as top-level bridge goes, I have no plans to play in the immediate future, at least through Lille.

this fall. He's a good baseball player, and I help keep stats for the team. He's pitching a game tonight in Palestine TX and I intend to be there. Later this week, he'll be playing for the Texas School of Baseball Cats in an AAU tournament in Charlotte NC, and I'll be there, too. My presence and support could be helpful to him at this time, so I have declined offers to play in Lille.

"The change of circumstances has been great emotionally. I feel like I'm on top of the world."

Declarer won the opening diamond lead with the ace, led a spade to the ace and ruffed a spade with the queen. However, after trumps were drawn there was no way to get rid of losing spades because the heart suit didn't pick up.

The declarer at another table at first was going to win the first trick with the ace, but then he paused. Finally he saw the solution. He ducked in dummy and ruffed. He cashed the high spade and ruffed a second spade with the queen. After drawing trumps, he cashed the ♥K and finessed the ♥10, not really caring whether it won or lost. South won with the queen, but was down to all red cards and had to put declarer back in dummy. The remaining spades were discarded on red cards -- 6♣ bid and made.

Since to beat the hand you need to find partner with a club honor, and since the jack is much more likely than the queen, you need to worry about a minor suit squeeze declarer may execute against you. You could try three rounds of diamonds, but declarer is far more likely to have the doubleton.

Berkowitz played a low diamond at trick 2. Cohen won with the queen and played a third diamond, and then Berkowitz got in to lead the fourth diamond. Declarer had:
