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European tournament open again in 2007



It's a long way from Italy to Hawaii, but European Bridge League President Gianarrigo Rona made the trip to the Fall NABC, in part to invite ACBL players to the 3rd European Open Bridge Championships.

The tournament is scheduled for June 15-30 in Antalya, Turkey, and will feature Mixed Teams, Mixed Pairs; Open, Women's and Senior Teams, and Open, Women's and Senior Pairs. All events are transnational (pairs and teams can be made of players from any combination of countries) and there will be cash prizes for overall finishers.

The EBL first opened a championship to all comers in 2003, in Menton, France, where ACBL players won two major events.

The venue for the 2007 championships will be the World of Wonders Resort, Kremlin Palace Hotel in Antalya.

For those concerned about security in Turkey, Rona said, the tournament venue will be open only to registered players.

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Onstott squad leads Open Board-a-Match

The team captained by John Onstott started with a bang and continued their strong play to take the lead after two qualifying sessions of the Mitchell Board-a-Match Teams.

Onstott is playing with Steve Beatty, Drew Casen, Jim Krekorian and a pair of Norwegians - Joergen Molberg and Terje Aa.

The Onstott team scored 19.5 out of a possible 26 in the first qualifying session - 75%. They followed it in the evening session with 17.5 to begin today's two final sessions just ahead of squads captained by Bill Eisenberg and Rhoda Walsh, tied for second-third.

Eisenberg's team is Connie Goldberg, Mitch Dunitz, Iftikhar Baqai, Nader Hanna and Wafik Abdou. The climbed into contention with a huge second session - 20 out of 26.

Walsh is playing with Mark Itabashi, Mark Lair and Neil Chambers.

Young Swedes making big impressions in U.S.

First it was Jenny Ryman, youngest-ever winner of the Blue Ribbon Pairs last year. On Saturday night, it was Sara Sivelind and Cecilia Rimstedt, winners of the Smith Life Master Women's Pairs in a tough field.

They are young, they are pretty, they are Swedish – and they are very good bridge players.

Four of the best and the brightest of a young crop of Scandinavian players were back at it on Sunday in the Mitchell Open Board-a-Match Teams: Emma Sjoberg, Sandra and Cecilia Rimstedt and Sivelind, playing with Ryman and Gavin Wolpert

(the other half of last year's Blue Ribbon champs).

What's more, they are veterans of NABCs, taken to the championships by their mentor, Swedish international Jill Mellstrom. The Rimstedt sisters and Sjoberg and Sivelind made it to the final of every national event they played in last year in Denver.

Their successes are not news to players across the Atlantic (Sivelind and Cecilia won the Junior World Open Pairs in Slovakia earlier this year). Says Mellstrom: “The Swedish players are getting good, especially the girls.”

It has not been by accident. “They work at it,” Mellstrom says. “They really work at it.”

Mellstrom says she really likes Cecilia's demeanor, much advanced for a 17-year-old. “She is very supportive of partner, and she never gives anything away at the table. If she is in a bad contract, you can never tell.”

One thing the young women have in common is a very early start in the game.

Cecilia has been playing since she was six years old, influenced by her bridge-playing parents and

Marion Weed-Snyder, two-time former North American champion, died Friday in Dallas after a long illness. She was 78.

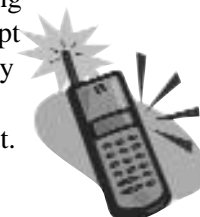
Weed-Snyder was married to Charles Weed of Shreveport LA for 18 years, during which time they lived in Dallas.

JUST FOR NEW PLAYERS

Love that ninth trump

Yesterday, we saw a deal where game was reached with only 20 HCP between declarer and dummy. Here is another bidding problem for you. You open 1♥ and partner makes an immediate limit raise to 3♥. Will you accept the game invitation holding

♠9 4 ♥A K 7 5 3 ♦K Q 7 5 ♣6 3?

The best agreement to have is for partner's immediate raise to 3♥ shows a good 10 to 12 total points and at least four hearts. Although you have only 12 HCP and one length point, I suggest you accept the game invitation at any form of scoring. However, if partner makes a limit raise showing the same number of points and only three hearts, I would stop in partscore. Without a big fit, your point count is a more accurate judge of how high to bid.

Here is the complete deal:

♠ A 7 6	♠ K 8 5 2
♥ Q 6 4 2	♥ 10 9

Losers are one spade, two clubs and one diamond, but dummy will have a heart left to ruff that diamond after trumps are drawn.

Make one small change to give partner only a three-trump limit raise, and you will not be able to make 4♥:

This doesn't seem like a big change, but now declarer is going to use up all of dummy's trumps to draw trump. The fourth diamond can no longer be ruffed. If declarer plays diamonds before drawing trump, East will ruff one of declarer's winners. Yes, 4♥ would make if diamonds split 3-3 or if the player with only two diamonds also had only two hearts. You also need hearts to split 3-2, and the whole package happens less than 40% of the time, not often enough for you to want to be in game at any form of scoring.

North's point count is the same on both deals. The only way declarer can make an educated decision about bidding game is for North to bid differently with the second hand. With only three trumps, North makes a two-step limit raise instead of the immediate limit raise made with four trumps. The first step of the two-step raise can be any forcing bid – probably 1♠ here. North will then rebid 3♥ to show a three-card limit raise. Knowing there is only an eight-card fit makes South's distribution look

less desirable for continuing. Opposite an immediate limit raise showing four trumps, South adds extra for his distribution and continues on to game.

You will bid more good games if you accept partner's immediate limit raise with a minimum as long as you have distribution. Without that or opposite a three-card limit raise, rely on point count. Here are some 1♥ opening hands. Which hands will accept a four-card limit raise? Which will accept a three-card limit raise?

1. ♠A 5 3 ♥A Q 7 6 3 ♦K J 4 ♣9 2
2. ♠Q 5 3 ♥A Q 7 6 3 ♦K J 4 ♣9 2
3. ♠Q 5 3 ♥A Q 7 6 3 ♦K J 7 4 ♣9

Hand 1 accepts any limit raise based on points.

Hand 2 passes both invitations. The bid is called invitational for a reason.

Hand 3 accepts an immediate four-card limit raise but passes a three-card limit raise.

Opening lead: ♠A

Bidding commentary: North has neither the strength nor the distribution, mainly the distribution, to double 2♠ (for takeout), but is strong enough to raise 3♥ to 4♥.

Defensive commentary: West starts with three rounds of spades, South ruffing. There is no pressing need for West to attack either minor suit.

Play commentary: Declarer has lost two spades and must lose a club, so the problem is picking up hearts for no losers. With no bidding as a guide, the normal play with nine cards missing the queen is the ace-king. However,

there has been bidding. West is known to have six spades and seven other cards known as "vacant spaces." East has two spades, so 11 vacant spaces. Who do you think is more likely to have the queen, the hand with seven vacant spaces or the one with 11? Right. Declarer plays East for the ♥Q, leads a heart to the king and runs the jack. Length attracts shortness, shortness attracts length.

Defensive commentary: If at any time the ♥J is led, East should not cover. One covers an honor with an honor only when promotion is possible. In this case, it is impossible. West is marked with a singleton or doubleton heart and

South has no promotable spot cards.

Slow Play

Slow play, as opposed to careful or thoughtful play, is discourteous to your opponents — and to all other competitors as well. Players and pairs who take more than their allotted time are subject to penalty.

In general, pairs who are rarely late will be warned while pairs who are habitually tardy and/or pay no attention to time limits will be penalized.

The young and the bold

You don't win NABC titles by being timid. This deal from the first final session helped young Swedish stars Cecilia Rimstedt and Sara Sivelind win the Smith Life Master Women's Pairs. They could have settled for a grand slam in spades, but opted instead for 7NT. (Hands are rotated.)

West led the ♦K, won by Rimstedt's ace. She led a club to dummy's ace, and advanced the ♥J. East did not cover. On different layouts, this may have been correct, but not this time. If she had covered, 7♠ could no longer be made. After the ♥J held, however, there were no second chances. Declarer led the ♠Q and then the jack, overtaking in hand. She continued to run her spade suit. With one to cash, this was the position:

On the lead of the ♠2, West discarded the ♥7, dummy discarded the ♣6, and East? If East discarded a club, dummy's ♣9 would be good. If she discarded a heart instead, the ♥A would drop the king and declarer's queen would be good. Note that if West had the club guard, instead of East, she would be squeezed between the minor suits.

Making seven was worth 25 matchpoints on a 25 top.



Janice Seamon-Molson and Gigi Simpson were second in the Smith Life Master Women's Pairs.

It's important for partners to be in tune, as Steve Garner and Howard Weinstein were on this deal from the second final session of the Nail Life Master Open Pairs, which they won by a less than a quarter of a board.

Weinstein's 2NT was minors, of course, and East's 3♦ showed a limit raise or better in spades. East's later jump to 5♠ was looking for second-round control of clubs.

Weinstein led the ♣K: 2, 5 10. This was a count situation in the Garner-Weinstein methods, so Weinstein knew Garner had three clubs.

He also figured Garner would not have gone out of his way to bid clubs without the queen. Accordingly, he played the ♣8 at trick two, taken by Garner with the queen.

The bidding told Garner his partner was void in hearts, so he exited in that suit. Weinstein ruffed and continued with the ♣A, ruffed.

Declarer played spades next. Garner won the ace, noted his partner's trump echo (showing three) and gave his partner a second heart ruff for three down. Plus 150 was good for 62 out of 64 matchpoints.

Not so fast

When someone presents you with an auction you have never seen before and tells you that Marshall Miles was at the table, you tend to assume he was the pitcher, not the catcher. Not so on this deal from the second final session of the Nail Life Master Open Pairs. Miles was playing with Leo Bell.

So what's so clever about reaching the par contract? Actually, 7♠ doubled down 800 is part-but that's not so easy to achieve, is it?

The other day in the Nail Life Master Open Pairs, a deal was passed out against David Berkowitz and Larry Cohen. The player who passed it out brought up the popular guideline for deciding whether to pass: if the number of high-card points and the number of spades in the hand equal 15, do something. Otherwise, pass.

Some players refer to that scheme as Pearson Points, others call it Casino Count.

Cohen thought it was Cansino Count, after the English player, Jonathan Cansino.

An argument – and a \$1 bet – ensued. Authoritative information on the subject was scarce, but Bridge World Editor Jeff Rubens settled the bet, in Berkowitz's favor.

Asked if Cohen had paid off, Berkowitz said it's a hard and fast rule between them – the big stuff, such as a Cavendish entry for \$2000, can wait until later. Golf and bridge bets, he said, "are sacrosanct – they must be paid immediately and in cash."

While he was at it, Berkowitz took the opportunity to complain about Cohen's less-than-flexible stance when it comes to giving strokes in their golf games.

"He takes advantage of me," said Berkowitz, "by not giving me enough strokes."

Not long ago, Berkowitz said, he spent about a week in the hospital with a bad infection.

"When I came out," Berkowitz recalled, "Larry said, 'You don't look so good – but you're not getting any more strokes.'"

Convention card reminder

Each player is required to have a convention card filled out legibly and on the table throughout a session. Both cards of a partnership must be identical and include the first and last names of each member of the partnership.

If a director determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership may play only the Standard American Yellow Card and may use only standard carding. This restriction may be lifted only at the beginning of a subsequent round after convention cards have been properly prepared and approved by the director. Further, the partnership will receive a 1/6 board matchpoint penalty for each board played, commencing with the next round and continuing until the restriction is lifted. In IMP team games, penalties shall be at the discretion of the director.

If the director determines the partnership has at least one substantially completed convention card but has not fully complied with ACBL regulations, the director may give warnings or assign such penalties as he deems to be appropriate under the circumstances.

The objective of these warnings and penalties is the encouragement of full compliance with ACBL regulations.

East's 2♦ bid is the famous Multi, showing a weak two-bid in either major.

England's Paul Hackett and John Armstrong were eventually to finish second in the event. Plus 1540 on this deal did no harm in their attempt to qualify for the final two rounds.

There was no way to have an intelligent conversation with partner over East's wafer-thin Multi opening, so Armstrong decided to just blast the slam and let East-West sort it out. It's hard to be too critical of West's double, but dummy was just perfect and there was no defense.

On to the final, and Armstrong picked up an even better diamond suit in the second session.

North led the ♠K. There isn't much prospect of an overtrick, but it does no harm to try, and who knows what will happen when declarer has a nine-card suit to run.

Armstrong ruffed the spade in hand, cashed the dxA and crossed to dummy with a diamond. He discarded a heart on the sxA, then ran the trumps. To save the overtrick, North has to keep either three hearts or at least two clubs, but he screwed up. Declarer came down to ♥7 ♦5 ♣7 5 opposite ♥A 6 3 ♣.

This was the ending when Armstrong played his next-to-last trump with South still to play:

North's inaccurate discarding meant that South was caught in a trump squeeze, needing to keep three hearts and two clubs. If he came down to two hearts, a heart to the ace and a heart ruff would establish the 13th trick. If South discarded

a club, declarer could play to dummy's ace and ruff a heart back to hand to cash the good cx7.

Plus 1390 scored 55 out of 64 matchpoints. Plus 1370 would have scored only 37MPs.

At another table, a cunning West passed a dealer. North opened 1sx and South bid 2NT, a forcing spade raise. Now West bid a quiet 3dx, North passed, and South doubled, believing that to be her way of showing a diamond splinter. North clearly didn't have the same understanding of the system, because he passed.

The defense was accurate, so that was three doubled overtricks for plus 1270 to East-West, but that gave North-South 43 matchpoints out of 64 – a triumph!?

Good luck, or bad?

Sylvia Moss is not known to be backwards about coming forward in the auction. On this deal (hands rotated) from the A/X Pairs, as North she decided to respond to a 15-17 1NT opener by showing 5-5 in the majors and a game-forcing hand with a jump to 3♠.

Judi Radin bid 4♥ and played there, wrapping up 10 tricks on a non-trump lead – she could cash plain suit winners and crossruff spades and diamonds. Afterwards, you would have expected Sylvia to feel she had been a little fortunate that 4♥ was declared from the South seat. If North were declaring, three rounds of trumps leaves you short of tricks.

Not so, said Sylvia: imagine that the defense cashes three hearts and shifts to a diamond. Since East is a passed hand, you rise with the ♦A, ruff a diamond and draw the last trump, pitching a diamond from dummy. Remarkably, despite the fact that both minor-suit menaces are badly placed, there is a repeating triple squeeze. In this position,

West still has to discard on the last trump. The discard of either minor suit lets declarer cash the winner there and repeat the squeeze – and a spade discard is immediately fatal.

Marsha May Sternberg Women's B-A-M

Play in the Marsha May Sternberg Women's Board-a-Match Teams concludes today with two final sessions.

At stake: the Marsha Sternberg Memorial Trophy, honoring a woman who died in 2001 after a six-week battle with cancer.

Her husband, Dr. Jim Sternberg of West Palm Beach FL, donated the trophy.

The winners of the 2005 contest were Lynn Baker, Kay Schulle, Lynn Deas, Beth Palmer, Daniela von Arnim and Sabine Auken.

Marsha Sternberg was a former *National Enquirer* associate editor and the first female writer for the tabloid. Sternberg, once reported to be the highest paid female journalist in America, left the *Enquirer* in 1989 and married Dr. Sternberg, a radiologist and bridge enthusiast. She joined ACBL in 1990 and became a Life Master in 1997.

Sternberg was outstanding in many fields -- she was an excellent pianist and a sailing instructor. She was also very successful in golf and tennis.

Coffin Trophy

The previous trophy for this event was the Coffin Trophy, one of the oldest and most historic trophies in NABC competition. It was retired.

For years there was only one "National" Women's Team championship -- and that was a board-a-match event.

Donated by Charles Emmet Coffin in 1933, the trophy was contested at the "Winter Nationals" in the days when there were only two NABCs -- Summer and Winter. In 1963 the event was moved to the new Spring NABC where it was in play until the format was changed to knockout teams in 1976.

NAP/GNT conditions of contest

The North American Pairs and Grand National Teams were created initially with the expectation that players would play in and represent the districts in which they lived. They were to be "grass roots" events.

Over the past several years, implementation of this original intent has become increasingly difficult. This is especially true in the top flight of the GNT as expert partnerships are established over increasingly large geographical distances.

Partnerships in all flights were also affected mostly where districts abut one another.

In an effort to restore the integrity of the original intent to these two great events, the ACBL Board of Directors, after lengthy and extended deliberations over two years, has approved for implementation the following measures:

Effective July 1, 2006 for the GNT 2006/2007 event.

Effective April 1, 2007 for the NAP 2007/2008 event.

GNT: A member's principal physical residence as of Sept. 1 of the year prior to the National Final shall establish the district in which said member is eligible to participate beyond the club qualifying stage, if any.

NAP: A member's principal residence as of June 1 of the year prior to the National Final shall establish the district in which the member is eligible to participate beyond the club level, if any.

In order to ensure that each participant at the unit or district level understands that a participant is affirming his or her eligibility, entry forms for unit and district finals should include the following statement: "By entering this event, I hereby certify, subject to penalties provided in the Conditions of Contest for the event and the ACBL Code of Disciplinary Regulations, that I am eligible to play in this event in this district."

It is expected that there will be virtually no exceptions to the residence requirements for participants in this event. A player seeking an exception must obtain permission in writing from the ACBL District Director representing the district in which the member has a principal residence and from the ACBL District Director representing the district in which the member wishes to play.

Both District Directors must approve the request for the exception to be granted. The player must begin this process by April 1 of the year prior to the National Final for the NAP and by July 1 of the year prior to the National Final for the GNT.

An ACBL Credentials Committee (CC), composed of ACBL Board members, has been established to clarify in which district a player is allowed to participate when said player's eligibility is in question. When a challenge to one's eligibility from a unit final stage or later stage has been made, the CC may request documentary evidence from the member whose eligibility is in question. If a member is unable to verify to the CC's satisfaction that he or she is playing in the district of principal residence, the CC shall automatically disqualify the member and his or her partner and teammates (if the event is the GNT).

When a member is disqualified by the CC, the CC may refer the matter to the ACBL President. Upon such referral, the ACBL President may make charges to the ACBL Disciplinary Committee in accordance with section 2.2.3 (d) of the ACBL Code of Disciplinary Regulations.

The ACBL recognizes that implementation of these measures may inconvenience some members who were granted exceptions for previous events. The general consensus, however, is that implementation and strict interpretation of these measures is necessary to restore the initial intention ("grass roots") and, therefore, integrity of application of the conditions of these events.
