A multi-national team captained by George Rosenkranz will battle a mostly New England squad led by Mel Colchamiro in the semifinal round of the Senior Knockout Teams while the other match pits Dennis Dawson and his bronze medalists from Monte Carlo against Murray Melton and his squad.

Rosenkranz (Miguel Reygadas, Mexico; Fred Hamilton, Las Vegas; Arnold Fisher, Clementon NJ; George Mittelman, Toronto, and Per Olof Sundelin, Stockholm, Sweden) led by only 5 IMPs going into the last quarter against Leonard Ernst (John Koch, Tony Ames, Richard Halperin, Dick Benson and Paul Schroeder). They pulled away, however, for a 151-122 win.

Dawson and his band of bronze medalists (Clement Jackson, John Sutherlin, John Mohan, Bobby Wolff and Dan Morse) blew away Marc Low (Sandra Low, Sue Sachs, David Sachs, Kenneth Badertscher, Martin Schiff Jr.). Dawson was leading 130-21 when Low withdrew.

Colchamiro (John Stiefel, Richard De Martino, Pat McDevitt, John Malley, Daniel Colatosti) had a struggle with Hamish Bennett (Bruce Noda, Harry Ross, Susi Ross, Dan Hertz, Natalie Hertz) but won out 124-116.

In the other quarter-final match, Melton (Simon Kantar, George Tornay Jr., Arnaud Barfus) ousted Chris Larsen (Joe Kivel, Allan Siebert, David

For the first time in bridge history, Turkey will be host to a world championship next year. The World Bridge Olympiad will take place in Istanbul from Oct. 23 to Nov. 6. Turkey's bridge players are very excited, and they are making all kinds of plans to make sure all contestants have a wonderful time.

Atay is an avid bridge player, but she's not playing in New Orleans — "promotion, just promotion," she said.

I guess most players with the West cards settled for an invitation to game at their second turn. There is a case for not consulting partner since they will always miscalculate heart length or shortness.

Indeed, 5♦ does look very good, does it not? Well, read on.

Sharon led a third/fifth ♣3 and JoAnna won the ♣A. She knew declarer was likely to be 4-4 in the minors. South's failure to bid spades and the absence of a support double or any action over 3♦ made the 4-1-4-4 hand type the most likely. So JoAnna found the trump shift at trick two.

Declarer won in dummy to lead a heart — and JoAnna ducked. That let Sharon in to play a second trump.

Declarer now needed the club finesse and something favorable in the majors. With the ♠Q offside, there was no way home.

Suit preference 101

Suit preference is a useful tool and its operation is not limited to when you give or receive a ruff. A simple example came on this deal:

East-West could have collected plus 200 from 3♥ doubled but this was not clear to either player. Sy Reich led the ♥K on which I played the ♥J. On the ♥A, I played the ♥10 — a clear call for the higher of the non-trump suits, namely diamonds.

Sy got the message and shifted to a diamond, letting me take the ♦A and lead to his king for the diamond ruff, which set 3♠.

Convention card reminder

Each player is required to have a convention card filled out legibly and on the table throughout a session. Both cards of a partnership must be identical and include the first and last names of each member of the partnership.

If a director determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership may play only the Standard American Yellow Card and may use only standard carding. This restriction may be lifted only at the beginning of a subsequent round after convention cards have been properly prepared and approved by the director. Further, the partnership will receive a 1/6 board matchpoint penalty for each board played, commencing with the next round and continuing until the restriction is lifted. In IMP team games, penalties shall be at the discretion of the director.

If the director determines the partnership has at least one substantially completed convention card but has not fully complied with ACBL regulations, the director may give warnings or assign such penalties as he deems to be appropriate under the circumstances.

The objective of these warnings and penalties is the encouragement of full compliance with ACBL regulations.

Light(ner) tales from the LM Pairs

My son Paul and I had two experiences with Lightner doubles during the LM Pairs. Since Lightner usually comes up about once every five years, to have two in one event is highly unusual.

The first occurred when I became the victim of a psychic Lightner double. I held ♠ A J x ♥ Q x ♦ A ♣ Q 10 9 x x x x. I opened 1♣ and the auction continued 1♠ by partner, 5♦ on my right, pass by me, pass, 5NT by partner. We play this as pick a slam, so I picked 6♣. This went pass-pass-double. I assumed this meant that RHO was about to ruff the opening spade lead so I corrected to 6♠. The play went ♥A, heart to the king, club lead and ruffed for down 2. With a spade lead against 6♣ doubled, I would have taken the first 15 tricks (seven clubs, seven spades and the ♦A).

The second came on an unremarkable hand (from my point of view). I held ♠ x x x ♥ J 10 x x ♦ A K x ♣ x x x. LHO opened 1NT, partner overcalled 2♦ showing diamonds and a major and RHO produced a majestic leap to 6♠. After two passes partner doubled. I led the obviously requested club and the club ruff plus my ♦A beat the contract two tricks. Both partner and RHO were 6-6-1, although partner was weaker. He had the ♥K and the ♦J.

I heard several good stories about this one. At two tables partner's hand overcalled 2♥ over 1NT showing the MAJORS! The black 6-6 now chose 6♣ which my hand doubled. The 1NT bidder, with ♥A and ♣ A K J, redoubled, and there was no way to go down.

At another table the opening bid was 1♣ and the red 6-6 chose to bid 2♣ Michaels! The black 6-6 tried 5NT (asking if partner had two of the top three club honors). He did, but the lead of the ♦J scuttled that contract.

The old 4-3 fit

George Jacobs won this deal in the bidding and the play as his victorious team had a huge round — 21.5 wins on 26 boards — in the first final session of the Open Board-a-Match Teams.

The field struggled in 2NT or so, but George (South) got to the excellent 4-3 spade fit. On the ♣6 lead to the ace and the ♣2 return, George had to read who had the club length. He guessed well when he went up with the ♣K and led a heart to the king and ace. Back came a heart, so George won the ♥Q, played the ♦A and ruffed a diamond, played the ♥J to pitch dummy's last club and led the fourth heart in this ending:

West pitched his last diamond and George ruffed, then thoughtfully cashed the ♠A-K. Whether West unblocked or not, George could be sure to score one more trick since if West wins the ♠Q, he would be endplayed in trumps to concede a club. If he did unblock both spade honors, the ♠10 would be the ninth trick.

New Gold Life Master

Dorothy Kane of Columbia MO scored well in the Senior Pairs, earning enough points to become a Gold Life Master (more than 2500 masterpoints). Her partner was Tina Hinds, also of Columbia MO.

Nice defense, guys

Joe Kivel appreciates a good defensive play — whether it's a teammate or an opponent. On this deal from the first final of the Life Master Open Pairs, the opponent was Joe Grue.

Grue was playing with Mike Moss. Kivel was playing with Jon Wittes.

Moss led the ♠10 and declarer played low from dummy. Grue overtook with the ♠J and continued with the ♠A and ♠K. Wittes ruffed the ♠K with the ♥10 and cashed two rounds of hearts.

Now he led the ♣Q and passed it to Grue's king. If Grue returns the obvious diamond, declarer rises with the ♦A and runs all his hearts, squeezing East in diamonds and clubs.

Grue, seeing the end position, returned a club and declarer was finished. He could not avoid the loss of a diamond for down one.

Kivel's other defensive gem comes from the Senior Knockout Teams where his teammates, Allan Siebert and Randy Pettit, defended 3NT.

Siebert led the ♣J to dummy's queen. Declarer led a low spade to his ace and back to the queen and Pettit's king. Pettit returned a club, won in dummy. Declarer led another spade and Pettit returned his last club. Declarer won his ace and led a low heart. Siebert flew with his ♥J and declarer was in a quandary — he couldn't duck because Siebert would cash his established clubs for down one. On the other hand, if declarer won dummy's ♥A, he could not take more than two heart tricks and would finish down one.

3NT made at the other table and the Kivel team had a sizeable pickup.

Just another Zia

masterpiece

You can always count on Zia to produce something spectacular at the bridge table.

I was kibitzing him during the final day of the Open Board-a-Match Teams when the following deal came up:

The auction will not win many awards and 6♠ would have been a much better contract. However, when playing board-a-match you have to assume that the slam was also missed at the other table and try to win the board in the play.

The defense found their best lead — a low diamond to the 9 and Zia's ace, taking away a very important entry from declarer's hand. Zia played a heart to the ace and then a low spade to the queen. He paused for a while considering his options and finally decided, based in large on the auction, that East must be a little bit more distributional than 5-5 and therefore must have a club void.

He cashed the ace of trumps, drawing the outstanding trumps, and led the ♣8 out of his hand. West missed his opportunity to shine when he failed to cover with the 10 (would you have found that defense?) and Zia let the 8 ride!

Had he played to the queen (or jack) he would be stuck on the board (remember that annoying diamond lead...), but now he was still in his hand and was able to repeat the finesse and throw his losing diamond on the ♣A, making 7!

He was rewarded when the slam was also missed at the other table, but unfortunately, his teammates led a heart, making declarer's route to 13 tricks an easy one, so the board was a push.

Smokescreen fails

Adam Wildavsky and Michael Polowan threw up a smokescreen on this deal from the second qualifying session of the Life Master Open Pairs. However, Boye Brogeland and Rose Meltzer had a fine auction that resulted in their getting to the cold grand slam.

Meltzer's cuebid was the key. It told Brogeland that she had a very good hand and a good fit in spades. That's all Brogeland needed to know. Making 2210 was worth 23 out of 25 matchpoints.

Greco honored for 2003 best defense

Eric Greco (and Geoff Hampson) of the United States earned the International Bridge Press Association Award for Best Defense with this effort at a Nebraska regional. Larry Cohen and Alan Truscott were honored in Monte Carlo earlier this month as the authors of the article featuring the defense.

One can just imagine the thrill for Greco and the anguish of the declarer as the deal unwound. So sad to go three off when at one point you can make 12 tricks! (Yes, if declarer plays the ♣A on the second round of the suit, West gets squeezed later.) But there was a sound reason for declarer's play. So was dummy sympathetic?

This is the article as written by Cohen and Truscott.

Cornhusker Defense

Anyone who spotted Warren E. Buffett of Berkshire Hathaway at the Summer North American Bridge Championships in Long Beach CA last month might have been excused for thinking that he was the wealthiest person present. However, that would have been wrong, for one of his teammates in the Master Mixed Teams was Bill Gates of Microsoft.

A week later, Buffett, back at his Omaha home, entertained a group led by another financial wizard, Peter Lynch, and played a friendly match. Lynch and his wife Carolyn then continued to the Nebraska regional tournament, played just outside the state, across the Missouri River, in Iowa. Their team was uniformly successful, winning three knockout events and the Swiss teams.

In one knockout event, Eric Greco, West for the Lynch team on the diagrammed deal, produced a stellar defense that will be a candidate for the best of the year.

At the other table, Greco's teammate South opened a 14-16 notrump, and dummy transferred to clubs and then showed spades. South bid 3NT and received a fourth-best ♦8 lead. Dummy's jack won, and the ♣Q went to West's king. West cashed the high diamonds, and declarer claimed 10 tricks for plus 630.

Contrast this with what happened at Greco's table. South opened 1♦, and again the dummy showed clubs and spades with South arriving in 3NT. Greco led a high diamond and got the discouraging deuce from partner Geoff Hampson. Even looking at all four hands, it's difficult to see a way to beat the game, but Eric found it. He played the ♦7 at trick two, won by South's 9.

Declarer crossed in spades (East showing an even number) and led the ♣Q for a finesse. Greco ducked in tempo. Declarer, afraid to lay down the ♣A (if East has king-third, he can't be let in for a diamond through), continued with dummy's ♣J, passed around to Greco's now bare king.

Greco continued the good work by shifting to the ♠Q. Not only did this pin the jack, but it also severed declarer from dummy's clubs. The ♣A was now blocking the suit. Declarer countered by ducking the spade! Had Greco woodenly continued spades, declarer could have won in dummy and thrown the ♣A to make the contract.

But, having done everything right so far, Greco wasn't going to fall from grace at that point. He accurately shifted to hearts, the final nail in declar-

er's coffin.

Declarer now had to fail by three tricks, down 300! Declarer, seemingly with nine top tricks, was held to two clubs, two hearts, one spade and one diamond trick. Making the right play in all four suits (at the right time), Greco earned 14 IMPs for his team with his superb defense.

New Life Masters

Terry Smith of Jacksonville FL got the last necessary points in the morning knockouts, partnered by Linda Stuart of Gainesville FL. He actually needed only .08 in this event because he had scored a victory in a knockout the day before. His teammates were Dale Paszgai and Roni Brazell of Palm Coast FL.

Sarah (Sherry) Weinberg of Mercer Island WA stitched her way to Life Masterhood. She is a pediatrician, but it's not that kind of stitching. She crossstitches everywhere – at medical meetings and when she's dummy. Her partner in the Zip Knockouts (the game that's played in the wee hours) was her husband John Weinberg, and their teammates were Joel Castoriano, Jim Salter and Hal Antonson, friends from Seattle, and Pat LaCerva of Mississippi.

Vada Gates of Shreveport LA has earned her gold card no matter how her team does today. She needed 6.75 and already has 11 in her bracket knockout. "And I'm going to get some more tomorrow," she said. Her partner was Larry Johnson of Minneapolis.

Jim Rash of Bellefontaine OH advanced to the semifinal round of the Tuesday-Wednesday Bracketed Knockout Teams, and that gave him enough points for his gold card. His partner was Pat Whalen, also of Bellefontaine. His teacher, Michael Pierce, and Carolyn Pierce of Ostrander OH were his teammates.

Gail Richardson and Marnie Hueston of Victoria BC played as partners in both the morning and the afternoon-evening bracketed knockout teams. They survived both to today's semifinals, and each earned enough points to become Life Masters. Richardson needed 7.17 and Hueston was 5.06 short. They won 9.94 points yesterday.

Joo-Hee Janicki of Markham ON went over the top in a bracketed knockout. She needed 20 points when she arrived in New Orleans, but she has done well in two knockouts and earned 29 points so far. Her partner is her husband Paul, who was happy about the fact that he was going to sleep with a Life Master for the first time in his life.

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Before her husband died, Kay didn't know Wolff very well – only as an acquaintance and as Norman's colleague, friend and opponent. When Norman died in January of 2002, Judy said, Wolff was one of the few to call her.

In the spring of that year, Wolff spoke fondly of Norman during a memorial for him during the North American Bridge Championships in Houston.

A little more than a year later, when Kay read that Wolff's team had won the right to represent the USA in the Bermuda Bowl, she sent him an e-mail with congratulations. He replied and suggested that they get together for a drink at the Summer NABC in Long Beach.

The date nearly didn't happen, but they finally went out with Dan and Joan Morse.

Kay dropped Wolff a line after the Long Beach tournament when she heard he wasn't feeling well. Then on Aug. 11, they started a series of e-mails that, in one week, resulted in the engagement that has the bridge world talking.

Seeing a different side of Wolff changed her view of him from aloof to something entirely different.

"I have the same feeling with him that I had with Norman," she said. "Some people don't get it right once. I'm batting 1000 – two for two – and it's getting better every day."

Wolff is equally happy and he puts it down to fate. "In bridge, timing is important – being in the right place at the right time," he said. "It's also true in life."

How did Turkey get interested in the idea of staging a world championship? It started in 2000 when the European Junior Championships were a tremendous success in Antalya, Turkey. "The feeling was so good," said Atay, "that we decided to make a bid at Maastricht. The World Bridge Federation liked the idea."

Turkey already has shown that its players can play bridge well. An all-Turkish team placed third in the Open Board-a-Match Teams a couple of days ago. Two years ago Nazliz Zorlu and Salvador Ajsael won the Blue Ribbon Pairs.

"Bridge is popular in Turkey," said Atay. "Our bridge federation is growing at a good rate. We're working especially hard to get young people interested in the game."

Want to find out more about Turkey? Go to Istanbul next year. There's an event for you. In addition to the Open and Women's Olympiads, there will be a Senior International Cup, the World Transnational Mixed Teams and the World University Teams Bridge Cup.

Bridge: the language of love

Bridge, says Curtis Cheek, is the language of love and it begins with making your interest known.

"Mystery is nice but a bridge auction only lasts about two minutes," Cheek said to a group of about 60 at Tuesday's Intermediate/Newcomer Speaker Program. "When you find an eight-card fit, make your interest known. It's even more important in competitive auctions. Identify your fits as early and as fast as you can."

When you don't have a fit, however, it's best to get out quickly. Cheek uses this example: 1♥-1♠; 2♣-2♥. "This is like closing time. This is not support – this is desperate. This is last call.

"On the second round of bidding, a preference to opener's first suit is a last resort, not a sign of interest. Both parties should recognize it for what it is."

Both parties should also recognize 2NT as "the universal invitation," said Cheek. "Would you like to dance? Are you busy tonight? Do you think the kids are asleep yet? It rarely matters what has led up to it. When one of the partners gets up the nerve to ask '2NT?', he is always interested in going further.

"Even in competitive auctions, 2NT is always forward-going – do you think the kids are asleep yet?"

The final recognition is taking care of partner. "Bridge may be a partnership activity," said Cheek, "but let's face it: we're trying to please ourselves. Ironically, the best way to ensure you are satisfied is to maximize your partner's enjoyment. Nature meant it to be that way.

"The more you give, the more you get."

Cheek's audience laughed appreciatively and began asking questions. Director Judy Cotterman, who is in charge of securing I/N speakers, smiled as she watched. The crowds have been big for the I/N speakers in New Orleans.

There's a talk daily at 12:15 p.m. and another at 6:45 p.m. in the I/N playing area – Mardi Gras A-B-C-D on the third floor.

Ruth Gregoria of Lauderhill FL is a first-time attendee at the NABC and the I/N speakers program. "I'm just beginning to take lessons," she said as she took notes.

Jack Domowitz of Parkland FL and Lynne Kupperman of Atlantic City came into the playing area a few minutes before Cheek's talk. They were looking at photos of different speakers when Cheek came up and started talking to them. Soon they were discussing different approaches to bidding.

"We try to come every day," said Kupperman. "We're new players, so we want to learn as much as we can. We're here for the whole 10 days. We're addicted."

IMP Strategy

(For Swiss Teams, Knockout Teams and IMP Pairs)

In a matchpoint event, we are always looking for that extra trick or playing in a risky major suit or notrump rather than a poor scoring, but safer, minor suit. Why? Because it pays off big time. We may even risk our contract to make a play for an overtrick. On defense we strive not to blow a trick rather than beat a contract.

When scoring is done by IMPs, however, the strategies change drastically. Now just making or beating a contract can give us a big score, but extra tricks are chump change. There are other considerations as well.

Make or set the contract. Do not worry about over (or under) tricks. If you are in the right spot, that will usually work out in your favor. Trust your bidding system.

Stretch to bid a game. If vulnerable, game should be bid even if it is as low as a 40% chance. If not vulnerable, it should be a 50% prospect.

Do not double their partial. You'd better have them down two in your own hand before you chance a double of a bid below game.

Do not go for numbers. Don't make some wild, preemptive bid just because you have six or seven (or more) cards in one suit. It is not worth it. Your competitive bidding should be more constructive at IMP scoring.

Play your safest contract. If in the bidding you find you have a better fit in a minor than a major, play in the minor, especially at a partial. You want to make whatever contract you bid. This also applies to game and slam bidding.

Do not stretch to bid slams. Only bid slams that are at least 75%.

You have partners at the other table. Don't make a risky bid or play because you think you are down in a match.

Don't be a hero. Do not make a confusing bid that (1) may be passed when it is forcing or (2) shows extra values that you don't have. Make the call that shows your strength.

Take out insurance. In every team game, there will be a hand where both sides can make game. Usually it is a wild hand with lots of distribution, doubles fits and long suits. It is usually right to bid one more unless you are sure they are going down and you cannot make your bid.

Take a chance to beat a contract. If your bold play sets a contract just one time in 10, you are ahead.

If it's hard for you, it's hard for them. The player sitting in your seat at the other table is holding the same cards you are. This guiding principle will help you on several of the points listed above.

Monte Carlo's first World Championship

The world championships held in Monte Carlo earlier this month brought back memories of the first time Monte Carlo was host to the Big Show back in 1976.

That was comeuppance time for Italy, whose Blue Team had won just about everything since the late Fifties. Not only did the Blues lose the Bermuda Bowl to the United States – they also gave up the Olympiad crown. Upstart Brazil came through in the last match to snatch the title.

The match between Italy and Brazil that never took place was quite interesting. I was with the Brazilian team as they compared scores – yes, they played, but . . .

When they got to Board 2, Gabino Cintra announced "Plus 1430."

"What?" screamed Gabriel Chagas. "We're plus 1430 too. Which way did you sit?"

That's how they found out that both halves of each team had been seated in the same direction, so there was no match. The director who was responsible had just directed his very last game for the WBF – that was for sure. After some mumbling and groaning, WBF officials decided not to set up a rematch. It never occurred to them that it might be the key match of the whole tournament. So the Olympiad was decided without the top two teams ever playing each other.

Three other major events took place back then in Monte Carlo. The United States retained the Venice Cup, Jimmy Patino was elected president of the World Bridge Federation – and my son Bill and his family drove up from Italy to visit me.

Glossary of bridge terms

New members of ACBL are often confused by the array of terms they hear: knockout teams, red points, rookie. Here's a list of some of the terms and their meanings:

Knockout Teams: an event in which a team (of four, five or six players — with four playing at a time) plays another team. The losers are eliminated or “knocked out” while the winners play other winners until only one team remains undefeated.

The length of a KO match may vary from a single session to a full day (the Vanderbilt and Spingold) to a multi-day event (the Bermuda Bowl).

Bracketed Knockout Teams: a KO event in which teams are divided into groups — usually of 8, 16 or 32 teams — based on their masterpoint holdings. The top group — Bracket I — and all other groups compete in a separate event with their own set of winners.

Compact Knockout Teams: a shorter version of Bracketed KO teams.

Swiss Teams: an event in which a team (of four, five or six players — with four playing at a time) plays other teams in seven-, eight- or nine-board matches. Team A sits North-South at Table 1 and East-West at Table 2 while Team B sits East-West at Table 1 and North-South at Table 2. The results are compared and scored by International Match Points (IMPs).

Pairings for the first round are random. Pairings for succeeding rounds are determined by a team's win-loss record or Victory Point total.

International Match Points (IMPs): the most common method of scoring Swiss Team matches. If Team A scores plus 620 for bidding and making 4♠ on Board 4 and Team B scores only plus 170 (they didn't bid the game), the difference is 450 — which converts to 10 IMPs. The IMP chart is shown on the inside of your convention card.

Victory Points (VPs): a method of scoring Swiss Team matches. After the scores are compared and converted to IMPs, the IMP total is converted to Victory Points. A team's VP total may be used to determine its next opponent and its final standing.

Side Game Series: single-session pair games that pay red points. Pairs may play in one, two or three sessions. Only pairs who play in at least two sessions are eligible for overall gold points.

Flighted pairs: When flighting is used, the field is divided by expertise or experience or both into several separate games. Flight A — “unlimited masterpoints” — is open to all players while the remaining flights are limited. Flight B might be 0-500 MPs or 0-1000 MP's while Flight C might be 0-300 or 0-500.

Each flight is scored individually, and masterpoint awards are made for each flight.

The masterpoint holdings of the players determine their flight. If one player is quite expert while his partner is new to the game, the pair must compete in Flight A.

In flighted events, you may play up but not down. That means you may play in Flight A or Flight B even if your masterpoint holding qualifies you for Flight C. Conversely, you may not play in Flight B or Flight C if you are a Flight A player.

Stratified Pairs: The idea is to compete against everyone but to be ranked only with your peers.

Each pair is assigned a stratum or “strat” based on the masterpoint holding of the partner with more masterpoints.

Example: A = 1000+ masterpoints; B = 300-1000 MPs; C = 0-300 MPs.

Thus, the most experienced players are placed in Strat A, intermediate players in Strat B and less experienced players in Strat C. Masterpoints are awarded for placings in all strats but gold points are awarded only in A and B.

The game proceeds normally — the difference comes when the scores are tabulated and ranked.

In a three-strat game, the scores are ranked three

times. The first ranking is done as in a regular open game. These are the Strat A results.

If a B or C pair does well in this ranking, they receive full credit for that performance. It is not all that uncommon for a Strat C pair to place first overall, and they receive the full masterpoint award for that game.

Note: A pair is eligible for only one set of masterpoint awards and automatically receives the highest award.

The second ranking compares the scores of only the B and C pairs — the scores of the Strat A pairs are eliminated. Once again, if a C pair does well, they receive points for their finishing position in the Strat B results.

The third and final ranking compares the scores of only the C pairs — all the scores of the Strat A and B pairs are eliminated.

Strati-flighted Pairs: The top group plays in a game of their own — Flight A. The rest of the field is divided into strats and plays as in a regular stratified pairs.

A recent innovation has been stratifying within Flight A. Flight A-1 may be listed as 3000+ MPs while Flight A-2 (or Flight X) may be listed as 0-3000 MPs.

Slow play, as opposed to careful or thoughtful play, is discourteous to your opponents — and to all other competitors as well. Players and pairs who take more than their allotted time are subject to penalty.

In general, pairs who are rarely late will be warned while pairs who are habitually tardy and/or pay no attention to time limits will be penalized.

Fine, but how did you get into caddying?

“A few years ago I was hanging around while my wife played, and this man said, ‘Doing anything?’ I said no. ‘How about doing some caddying?’ So I started, and I’ve been doing it ever since. This is my fifth NABC as a caddy.”

Jackie Matthews, the caddy master, says Aiken is someone she can really count on. “He always picks up two sections of pairs, and a couple of times when we were short-handed he’s done three.”

His wife plays lots of bridge. Does he ever play?

“I play once in a while — not that often. I try to make sure that I don’t get addicted to anything, and apparently it’s easy to get addicted to bridge.”

Aiken takes medication to ward off Alzheimer’s — clearly it is working. He was having serious trouble sleeping at night, but now he uses oxygen, “and I sleep like a baby.” He has arthritis — “That’s one of the benefits of old age.”

How does he get along with all the other caddies, most of whom are in their teens and twenties?

“Just fine. Of course I usually don’t know what they’re talking about.”

He looked around the room. “The director just called the move. I have to go and pick up my tickets. I enjoyed talking to you.”

Rules for being a good partner

By Marty Bergen

"I have always believed that your attitude toward your partner is as important as your technical skill at the game," said Rixi Markus, one of the all-time great players.

Before you sit down to discuss what you are playing, you should start your partnership off on the right note. Half the battle of winning is being a good partner. Always observe the following:

1. Do not give lessons unless you are being paid to do so. According to an evening paper, there are only five real authorities on bridge in this country. Odd how often one gets one of them as a partner. Punch (British magazine).

2. Never say anything to your partner unless you would want him to say the same to you. If you are unsure whether your partner would want you to say something, don't.

3. Never "result" (criticize your partner for a normal action just because it did not work this time).

4. Unless your intent is to clear up a misunderstanding, avoid discussing the hand just played. If you cannot resist, be discreet.

5. Remember that you and your partner are on the same side.

6. Do not forget that your partner wants to win just as much as you do.

7. If you feel the urge to be nasty, sarcastic, critical or loud, excuse yourself and take a walk.

8. When there is time between hands, do not discuss bridge.

9. When you want to consult another player about a disaster, ask about your hand, not your partner's.

10. Do not ever criticize or embarrass your partner in front of others.

11. Remember that bridge is only a card game.

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Junior coupons

Junior coupons are good for entry to any event for just \$6 per session. Coupons will be available only to ACBL members who are residents of Zone 2 (North America including Bermuda) who are either (1) 21 years of age or younger or (2) full-time students between 22 and 25 years of age. Full-time students must offer proof of eligibility prior to purchasing their entry.

Pre-Alert/Disclosure forms

If your partnership plays special overcalls, you must fill out a pre-Alert/Disclosure form and make it available to your opponents when you play in events that allow Mid-Chart and Super-Chart conventions. This applies to NABC+, regional or higher knockout and Flight A Swiss games. Look for the light blue forms on the table where convention cards are available.

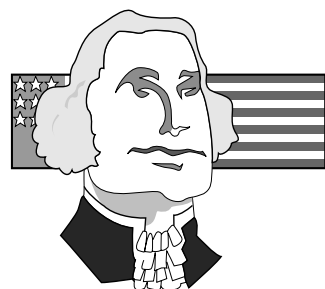
