## USA Looking for a Clean Sweep

With eight pairs in the top ten, the USA is dominating the final of the World Mixed Pairs Championship. Perhaps that is not so surprising given that America has supplied almost half the 182 pairs who are contesting the final. After the first session Becky Rogers and Jeff Meckstroth hold a narrow lead over Judi Radin and Zia. France's Elizabeth Hugon and Jean Jacques Palau are a close third and those three pairs have a little daylight between themselves and the next three pairs, Beth Palmer and Steve Robinson, Sally & Kit Woolsey, both of USA and China's Yu Zhang and Shaolin Sun.

With so many great players in the field and two sessions to play today, no one is counting their chickens, but it will be no surprise if the winners prove to be one of these six pairs.

In percentage terms the Netherlands deserve a mention, as all their five pairs (plus two transnational combinations) made it to the final.

## Session Three

# Qualifying Transnational Mixed Pairs

With one qualifying session to play in the Mixed Pairs, many pairs were fighting to get into the qualifying places while others were secure and looking to maximize their carry-over - a significant factor as it carries the weight of a full session in the final. Having picked a very dull series of boards in the first session, my choice proved to be much more lively this time.

At my first table the deal was passed out by Gary & Jan Soules/Barry Rigal & Sue Picus - not a great start to my day. However, there was more action when I watched the deal for a second time.

Pascale Thuillez's 3NT response to husband Laurent's opening bid showed a balanced four-card raise to game. Not surprisingly, Laurent had no interest in going beyond game. Tony Forrester led the ♣7 and Laurent won dummy's ace and had to pick up the trumps without loss to bring home his contract, given that the diamond suit was lying favourably. A lot of matchpoints swung on declarer's play. Forrester's opening lead was unclear but looked as though it might be from shortage and it seemed normal to start with the ♠A from hand. There was an unavoidable spade loser now and Thuillez was down one for -50.

In the first auction Jan Soules' 2♣ overcall showed any single-suiter. Two Diamonds was a transfer and the double showed some diamonds and values. In the second auction, 2♥ was a transfer overcall and 2NT Lebensohl. Forrester's 4♣ bid showed willingness to compete in whichever suit his partner held.

Sue Picus led the king of hearts and Jan Soules won the ace,

drew two rounds of trumps and played a diamond to her queen. She exited with a heart and Picus won and switched to a club. Rigal won and played back the ♣J. Declarer could ruff but had no option but to pray for a doubleton ace of diamonds; down one for -100.

Forrester led the jack of spades. Thuillez won the ace and cashed the king, on which Kathie Wei-Sender threw the ♠9, reverse. Declarer played the ♠K, Wei-Sender following with the eight, and Forrester won the ace. A heart switch defeats the contract, and perhaps Wei-Sender intended the second club as suit preference for hearts. But if declarer had ♥KJ rather than the ace, Forrester did not wish to open up the suit. If partner held the ♣7, a second club would be safe, and after some thought he played the ♣Q. Thuillez ruffed that and crossed to hand with a trump to lead the ♣7. Forrester covered and a few seconds later declarer had claimed ten tricks, the heart loser disappearing on the established club; +620 and a lot of match-points for the French pair.

North's heart suit is nothing to get excited about but we would all open with a weak two bid at this vulnerability, as did Rigal and Lev. Picus enquired and, on finding that she faced a maximum hand but with a bad suit, bid game. This looks very aggressive to me and it resulted in a very poor game being reached.

Gretchen Topp found the best lead of a club and Stephen Peel was allowed to hold the first trick with the jack. He continued with the ♣K to the ace and Rigal played a diamond to king and ace. Peel cashed the club then exited with a diamond. Rigal drew two rounds of trumps and got his spades away on the minor-suit winners, but the two trump losers meant that he was down two for -100.

Tobi Sokolow responded 3♥, pass or correct, to Sam Lev's multi. Ralph Katz doubled for take-out and Martha converted that to penalties. The club lead was easier to find with South as declarer. Sokolow won immediately and led the diamond to the king and ace. Katz cashed the ♣J then ♣Q before switching to a spade for the jack, queen and ace. Again, declarer could avoid a spade loser, but the bad trump split meant down one for -100.

Topp's INT opening was 10-14 and her 3♠ bid accepted the game invitation while showing the fifth spade. Picus led a top of nothing diamond and Rigal won the ace to switch to the queen of clubs. That was ducked so he continued with a low club. Declarer has only eight winners even if she guesses to play low on this trick, short of some inspiration in spades. Play was speeded up considerably when Topp rose with the king and the defence cashed out for one down; -50.

With dummy having bid diamonds, there was a serious danger that Sokolow would give a trick on the opening lead - diamonds are the only safe suit to lead. Sure enough, she chose the jack of hearts, and now declarer had a chance. Katz took a long time to play to trick one before finally winning dummy's ace and playing on diamonds. Lev ducked the diamond twice and now Katz decided finesse the ♥10 then switch her attention to spades. When the suit failed to behave as required, she played a fourth round to Sokolow's jack. Sokolow put Lev in with the ace of diamonds and he switched to the queen of clubs. When declarer covered the first club, the defence had the rest of the tricks as Lev had kept nothing but clubs; down two for -100.

Both Wests thought that their hand was worth an opening bid despite the vulnerability and lack of intermediates. Peter Weichsel made the normal American rebid of 2♠ while Laurent Thuillez made the normal French rebid of 2♣ - the French are very keen on four-card support for an immediate raise.

The French auction saw Pascale rebid 2NT, which she managed to bring home after a diamond lead to the ace and a diamond back; +120.

Lev passed over 1♥ but then made a take-out double when the opposition found a fit in his short suit. Sokolow was happy to pass with her excellent spade holding. She led the jack of diamonds to the ace and Lev switched to his trump. Rose Meltzer won the king of spades and played a club to the jack then cashed the ♠A and ♦KQ. She ruffed a diamond low next but when she now tried for a club ruff in hand Sokolow could over-ruff and return a trump to the bare king. That was one down for -200.

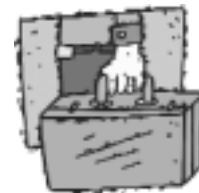
When Weichsel's pre-empt came around to her, Sokolow made what looks to be the normal call of 3NT, where she played. Weichsel led a club and Sokolow won in hand and started to run the diamonds. After following to one diamond each, East threw four spades while West threw four clubs. Now Sokolow had a unfortunate physical lapse when she pulled the ♣2 instead of the last diamond. Of course, although she spotted the error immediately, the card was played. A spade towards her hand would have allowed Sokolow to make no less than twelve tricks, but she had convinced herself that the ♠A was offside and instead tried the jack of hearts, the idea being to create an entry to hand with the ♥Q. When Weichsel had the ♥K and could cash a club, Sokolow had an awkward discard and chose the winning diamond as Meltzer threw another spade. Weichsel exited with a heart and Sokolow again went wrong, winning in hand and trying to split the hearts rather than winning in dummy to lead to the ♠K. That meant she made only nine tricks for a very poor score.

The play of the ♥J looks wrong as if the ♠A is with West then surely the ♥K will be with East and a spade will come through the king. Better to just play for the ♠A to be onside - but it is easy to lose a little concentration after making one of these once-a-year physical slips.

Canadian pair Malcom Ewashkiw and Charlotte St. Amant reached an uncomfortable spot when St. Amant chose to make a take-out double of 3♣ rather than overcall 3NT. When Ewashkiw jumped to 4♥, St. Amant could see that slam might be possible opposite the right hand - as little as ♥AKxxx, perhaps - and made a slam try, which Ewashkiw quickly rejected. Ewashkiw won the club lead in dummy to take the heart finesse and was delighted to find the doubleton king onside. He switched his attention to diamonds now and there was nothing the defence could do; eleven tricks for +650.

## Front runners

After reading the Sunday headline in the Daily Bulletin, Zia Mahmood was wondering whether he is about to become classified as one of the "best players never to win a world championship."

Certainly he is one of the best players in the world - and he's working on the world championship part in the Mixed Pairs with Judi Radin, owner of four world titles.

After two qualifying sessions, Zia and Radin were leading and well on their way to qualifying for the final. Zia joked that he had presented Radin with four pages of system notes, only to have her toss out three of them. Despite the fact that they had only about 10 minutes of discussion (according to Zia, anyway), they were rolling along on the strength of aggressive card play and a bit of luck.

This deal, on the second round, served up the old reliable plus 200 for the first-round leaders.

Zia led a low spade to Radin's ace, and she followed with the ♣A, a club to Zia's king and a club ruff. Another spade put Zia in, and he continued with a fourth round of clubs. West ruffed with the ♥A. He then played the ♦K and ruffed when Radin covered, a

spade ruff followed, then another diamond ruff and a claim. The damage was done, however.

On this deal, Zia made a thoughtful play to help his partner on defense.

Zia started with a low diamond, taken in dummy with the ace. Declarer cashed the top clubs, discarding a diamond, and could have done much better by taking the heart finesse, but he ruffed a club and exited with his diamond. Zia, noting the fall of Radin's ♦K at trick one, diagnosed the layout and rose with the ♦Q to put a trump on the table. Radin inserted the 9, which declarer won with the 10. Stuck in his hand, declarer played the ♥A and ♥Q. Radin won and cashed the ♠A, followed by the ♠Q, eliminating dummy's trumps. Declarer lost three hearts, one diamond and a spade for plus 110 and a fine score for Zia and Radin.

The opponents - Ann Raymond of New York in particular - were a bit tougher on the following deal. Raymond was East.

Zia speculated that he might have overcome the five-level preempt had he bid 5NT when the auction got back to him, but that takes nothing away from Raymond's enterprising tactic. North-South, of course, are cold for slam in either black suit.

Zia got even on the next deal, also using hearts to jam the auction.

As you can see, slam in diamonds or spades is a maker. East, however, took a curious view in spades, playing low to the 8 after winning the opening heart lead in dummy. Minus 650 was a very good score for Zia and Radin.

The two ended the first day of play in the Mixed Pairs with an average of 63.8%. All they needed in the third qualifying session was to stay in their seats.

They did more than that, despite some indifferent results, and were leading the field going into the final three sessions.

On Board 1, declarer had more than one way to succeed in 3NT, but Zia took away one of them with another thoughtful defensive play.

North opened a strong 1NT and was raised to game by South. Radin led the ♥5 to the jack and queen, and Zia returned the 9, overtaken by Radin with the 10 as declarer ducked. When Radin continued with the ♥8 to the ace, Zia discarded the ♠J, trying to conceal his possession of the queen to deflect declarer from one of his winning lines of play.

As you can see, declarer could have made the contract by playing Zia for the key cards in diamonds or by playing a spade from dummy, going up with the ace and ducking if Zia followed low - or playing low if Zia put in the queen. That was far from clear, however, and there was an established heart suit looming in the East hand. North cashed four rounds of clubs, giving Zia his chance to get rid of his second spade honor.

In the end, North simply cashed the ♦A, going quietly off one. The following deal shows Zia at his best, working out the correct line of play in a difficult slam.

Zia's 4♣ was forcing, and after the cuebid of 4♦ by Radin, Zia asked for key cards with 4NT, bidding the aggressive slam when Radin showed three.

There would be no story if North had led a club, a diamond or a low spade, but he started the defense with the ♠10, which went to the 2, jack and ace. Zia thought about his next play for a long time before putting the ♠6 on the table. North followed low, giving Zia brief pause again, but he finally decided to let it ride. That was trick number 12 and Zia had the unlikely slam and just about all the matchpoints.

It would not have mattered if North had covered the ♠6. Zia would win the king, then run his winners, arriving at this end position:

On East's last club, Zia discards his low diamond (South's play is immaterial) and North is caught in a strip-squeeze. He cannot discard a spade or Zia will claim 12 tricks with the queen and 7. So North must discard his ♥J, whereupon Zia sticks him in with the ace to lead into the spade tenace at the end.

Radin, who had not paid much attention to the play, commented: "I'm still not sure what went on."

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# Of Scrum-halves and Computer Kings

by Patrick Jourdain (Wales)

Wearing the team uniform of Wales at the reception following the Opening Ceremony had its advantages. Seeing the red dragon of Wales on the blazer pocket, a couple approached. "We're from Australia, but one branch of the family came from Wales," they said. "The name's Farr-Jones".

"That name is more associated with rugby than bridge," I said. (For those unfamiliar with the game of rugby, Nick Farr-Jones of Australia would be on any list for a World Alltime Team. To an American he might be described as the Michael Jordan of Australian rugby.)

I had said the right thing. "Nick Farr-Jones is our son," said Rosemary and Max. Australia and Wales are as close geographically as they are alphabetically, but a partnership between the two was formed for the Mixed.

A journalist is always seeking good copy, and a well-known opponent adds spice to the story, so it was fortunate that both our boards against Bill Gates and Sharon Osberg were worth reporting:

Gates alerted the response of INT but the subsequent auction made clear it had been forcing! Osberg's raise to Six Clubs was sensible though, as Gates explained, his suit could be as few as two cards (when opener's shape is precisely 4-5-2-2).

Rosemary Farr-Jones led a spade. Declarer's problem was how to take advantage of a favourable layout in either red suit.

Gates won the spade lead in hand, laid down one top trump, on which the queen fell, ruffed a heart, returned with a trump, ruffed another heart on which the king appeared, ruffed a diamond, ruffed a third heart seeing the fall of the ace, ruffed a diamond finding that suit was not going to contribute an extra trick, but was able to cash the queen of hearts as his twelfth trick.

The fall of the singleton queen of clubs does give declarer the option of reverting to a cross-ruff, planning to make nine trump tricks and the three outside winners, but if the queen of trumps is outstanding then declarer's timing of the red suit ruffs was best, as he had retained the chance of a diamond break if the hearts did not provide the extra trick.

Double dummy it is possible to make all 13 tricks by taking advantage both of the fall of the trump queen and the top hearts. You win the opening lead in dummy, ruff three diamonds and three hearts, drawing one high trump on the way, and then use dummy's jack of trumps to draw East's last trump, before returning to hand with the spade king to enjoy the heart queen.

Six Clubs making brought our computer king 369 out of 414 matchpoints.

The companion board showed bank executive Osberg's expertise as declarer:

Farr-Jones looked a little worried about passing my double with a void in trumps, but all was well. The defence began: club to the ace, club to the king, spade to the king, ace of diamonds. We had four tricks in the bag and my five trumps were still all in place behind declarer, so you might expect two down, but East quite naturally continued with a second diamond, and Osberg was not unhappy to reduce her trump holding by ruffing low. One top trump revealed the layout in the suit, and she used the spade entry in dummy to ruff another diamond.

In the ending declarer laid down a top spade knowing, when I ruffed, she would make her nine of trumps on the return, and then, when she played the last spade, I could ruff again but would have to let her make her jack of trumps in hand. One down for 200 to the Australia/Wales combo was a respectable result for the USA pair (140/414 MPts), particularly when you appreciate that Osberg managed to make all six of her own trumps.



## Bridge In The Fast Lane

Our friend Haig Tchamitsch, who often produces good bulletin hands himself in North American tournaments, was on the receiving end on this deal from the second session of the Mixed Pairs Qualifying. Unfortunately, he could not remember who the opposing declarer was and it proved to be beyond the wit of your reporter to calculate who this should be from the starting positions and movement.

South opened 1♣ and Haig overcalled 2♠ as West. North jumped to 4♥ and East bid 4♣. Now South leapt to 6♥ and Haig doubled. Well, that looks OK, does it not, because even if partner gets off to the wrong lead there are still two club losers.

Sure enough, where a spade lead would have guaranteed the defeat of the contract, East actually tried to cash a diamond. Declarer ruffed and led the queen of hearts to the king and ace. Back to hand with a heart, declarer led the ten of clubs and, you've guessed it, East covered and declarer ducked in the dummy. When the bare ace fell, declarer was able to finesse against the remaining club honour and had twelve tricks. As you can imagine, -1660 was not worth many matchpoints to Haig and his partner.

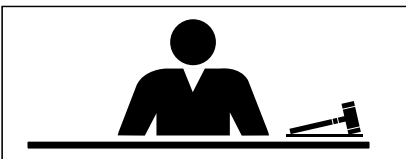
I guess that double dummy you would make 3NT if played by North, however, that is pretty well impossible to achieve. Given their opponents' auction, the Truscotts did very well to get into the bidding and to a making contract, particularly as that contract was in a suit bid by the opposition.

Daniela led ace and another spade to dummy's king. Alan led a heart to the jack and king, won the heart return and ran the jack of clubs. After three rounds of clubs he could cash the hearts to pitch his low diamond. That was nine tricks for +110. Allowing East/West to play and make 2♠ would have been a disaster for North/South, so all credit to Dorothy for finding that balancing double.

**Contract:** Three Spades, played by East.

**Result:** 8 tricks, -50 to E/W.

**The Facts:** One NoTrump was weak (12-14 HCP). The double was Alerted and explained as clubs.

**The Director:** Was called at the end of the auction, after West explained that his double was penalty over a weak notrump. East still disagreed. North told the Director away from the table that he would have bid a natural 2♣ if he had known the double was penalty. South said she would not have changed any of her calls. The Director allowed play to continue. At the end of the play West told the Director that the auction proved that East had high cards because of North's failure to redouble. When asked why he had bid over 2♣ West said that although 2♣ was Stayman he decided to bypass his spades because he had a balanced hand. The Director ruled that West had unauthorized information (UI) from East's Alert and explanation and that pass was a logical alternative for West.

**Ruling:** West's 2NT bid was canceled. The score was adjusted to Two Clubs down four, -200 for E/W. E/W appealed.

**The Players:** E/W said they were once a regular partnership but had not played together for 5 years. E/W's convention card listed a defense against strong notrumps only: double showed either a five-card minor and a four-card major or both majors; 2♣ showed four clubs and a five-card major. West said he bid 2NT because he

knew from North's failure to redouble that his partner had points. When it was pointed out his 15 points added to South's maximum (14 points) and North's maximum (8-9 points) left East with at most 2-3 points he had no response. When asked what he would have done had he not heard East's explanation (as behind screens) West said he would still have bid 2NT. E/W were then asked what 2♣ would have meant if the double was known to be penalty. East said it would have been a general runout asking West to bid his suit (when asked what he would do if his double was based on a balanced hand without a suit she did not know); West said he would have played it as showing clubs and a higher suit. When asked why he was appealing the Director's ruling West said he understood the need for an adjusted score but could not understand why his side was forced to play in 2♣ down 200. He thought some other adjustment (he could not say what) would be more appropriate.

North said he could not bid 2♣ naturally after the double was explained as clubs as 2♣ by him would then have been Stayman. Thus, he was forced to pass.

**The Committee:** Was disturbed by West's failure to appreciate his obligation to avoid taking any advantage that might derive from the UI. They noted that E/W had committed two infractions: misinformation to N/S (that the double showed clubs) and UI to West (that East thought West had shown clubs). The Committee discussed several possible ways of dealing with these infractions. (1) Treat the situation as purely one of UI. Cancel West's 2NT bid, force him to pass, and adjust the score to 2♣ by East down four, -200 for E/W. (2) Deal with the two infractions separately, in turn. If North had been given the correct information he would have run from INT doubled to 2♣ (natural, showing clubs and a higher suit). East, still believing her partner held clubs, would pass to await further developments, at which point it would go all pass. Adjust the score to 2♣ by North making three, +110 for N/S. Then, to address West's use of UI, E/W would be assessed an additional procedural penalty (one-half board was suggested as appropriate). (3) Assign E/W a score using (1) and N/S a score using (2). The first approach had the advantage of being simple, consistent with the way the Directors handled things, and imposing the most unfavorable bridge result on E/W. The second approach had the advantage of dealing with both infractions (rather than ignoring one of them) and keeping the issues of redressing damage and procedurally punishing the use of UI separate. The third approach had the advantage of not assigning N/S an unduly favorable result when they would likely have ended up playing 2♣ making three had there been no infractions. After some discussion the Committee decided to adopt approach (1).

**The Committee's Decision:** Director's decision upheld.

Il s'embarque donc sur un voyage de découverte. Remarquez qu'il doit faire ceci avant de tirer les atouts comme il lui faudra deux entrées au mort pour jouer les cœurs.

Il joue donc un carreau vers la dame pour voir qui a l'as. Si Est l'a, la position de l'as de cœur ne sera toujours pas connue; mais si c'est Ouest qui l'a, alors Est détient sûrement l'as de cœur pour son enchère.

C'est Ouest qui prend l'as de carreau et, comme Est doit maintenant avoir l'as de cœur, Horne est obligé de placer le valet et le 10 dans la main d'Ouest comme c'est le seul moyen de réussir son contrat. Il joue donc le Roi de pique et un petit pique au 10 du mort. Ensuite un cœur qu'il laisse filer à l'as. 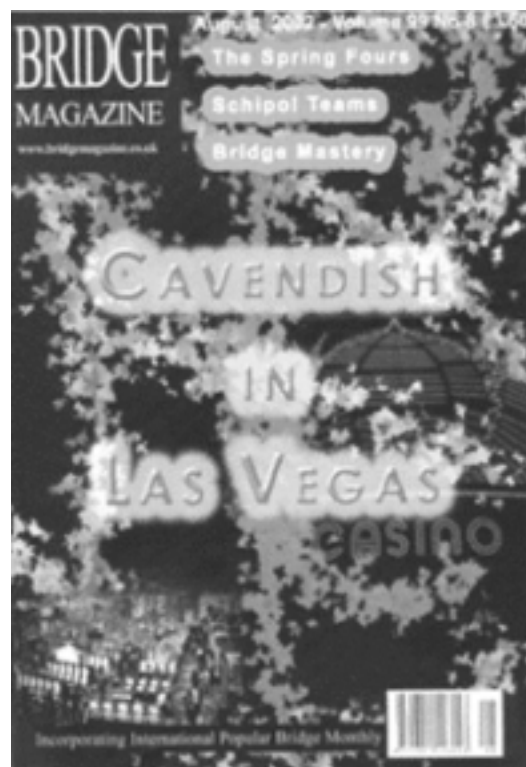
